During the roll call, each secretary gave a short history of the forum and a project of interest during the year. North Trafalgar received the prize for having the most members, present, sixteen. Their project reported was the beautifying of a farm home in the community and lending a hand at cleaning up after a disastrous farm home fire.

R. S. Heatherington announced that a folk school would be held in mid-January at the home of Mrs. Ray Coulter, Campbellville. The theme will be "Can we be an asset to our community?" and discussions will centre on the church and home, health and organizations.

Miss Edith Ferguson, assistant secretary of the provincial farm radio forum, explained some of the tasks of the provincial office and the manner in which the mail is handled.
