HALTON NIGHT SCHOOL OFF
TO A SPLENDID START

Three hundred folk were in attendance on Tuesday evening of last week for the opening of the Night Classes being held in Milton. Courses are being given in Farm Business, Farm Machinery, Woodworking, Elementary Clothing, Advanced Dressmaking, Tailoring, Choral Singing, Leathercraft, Effective Speaking, and Oil Painting. The response to the announcement sent out in October was far greater than anyone ever anticipated. The closing date for application was Nov. 1st, when 312 folk both rural and urban, from all sections of the County, had made application for some one of the Courses offered. We are informed by A. T. Woodley, chairman of the Committee in charge, that due to lack of accommodation it has not been possible to accept many other applications which have come forward since that date. Eight of the courses are being held at the Milton High School, and some 90 ladies participating in the Clothing and Tailoring Courses are holding forth in the Sunday School Room of St. Paul's United Church and in the hall at the Farmer's Building. A staff of 15 has been secured from such points as Guelph, Hamilton, Dundas, Mimico, Toronto and Milton district. The Committee in charge has had many problems, with which to cope, and while some adjustments here and there will have to be made, it would appear that the great majority of those enrolled are more than delighted with the opportunities which are being presented.
