Music in Worship is Church Service Theme

The services at St. John's on Sunday were set apart as a special tribute to the place of music in worship. Special music was offered at both services by the Junior and Senior Chorus under the leadership of N. Laird, director of music. The morning service opened with the processional hymn "When morning gilds the sky." The combined choirs sang "Let All Together Praise the Lord" and the anthem "Hail Mighty Victor." The Junior Choir sang as their anthem "Flocks in Pastures Green, Abiding" and the Senior Choir sang the anthem "Great is the Lord." A trio comprised of Miss Ruth Evans and Isobel Dabson and Mrs. J. Bailey sang "Lift Thine Eyes." Rev. John M. Smith spoke on the theme "A Singing Religion" in which he noted the Christian's reason for singing and the importance of their song as a song of praise, strength, victory, hope and inspiration.

The evening Worship was centred on the theme "The Ministry of Music" and Mr. Smith stressed the importance of music in worship as a medium of drawing people closer to God. The organist and choir, he said, were set apart as instruments through which the Holy Spirit could work in inspiring and empowering individuals. The Junior Choir sang as their anthem "O Saviour Sweet" and the Senior Choir sang "O For a Closer Walk With God." The combined choirs sang "God Bless Our Land" and "Break Thou The Bread of Life." Mrs. Core of St. Paul's United Church, Brampton, was guest soloist and sang "O Holy Lord."

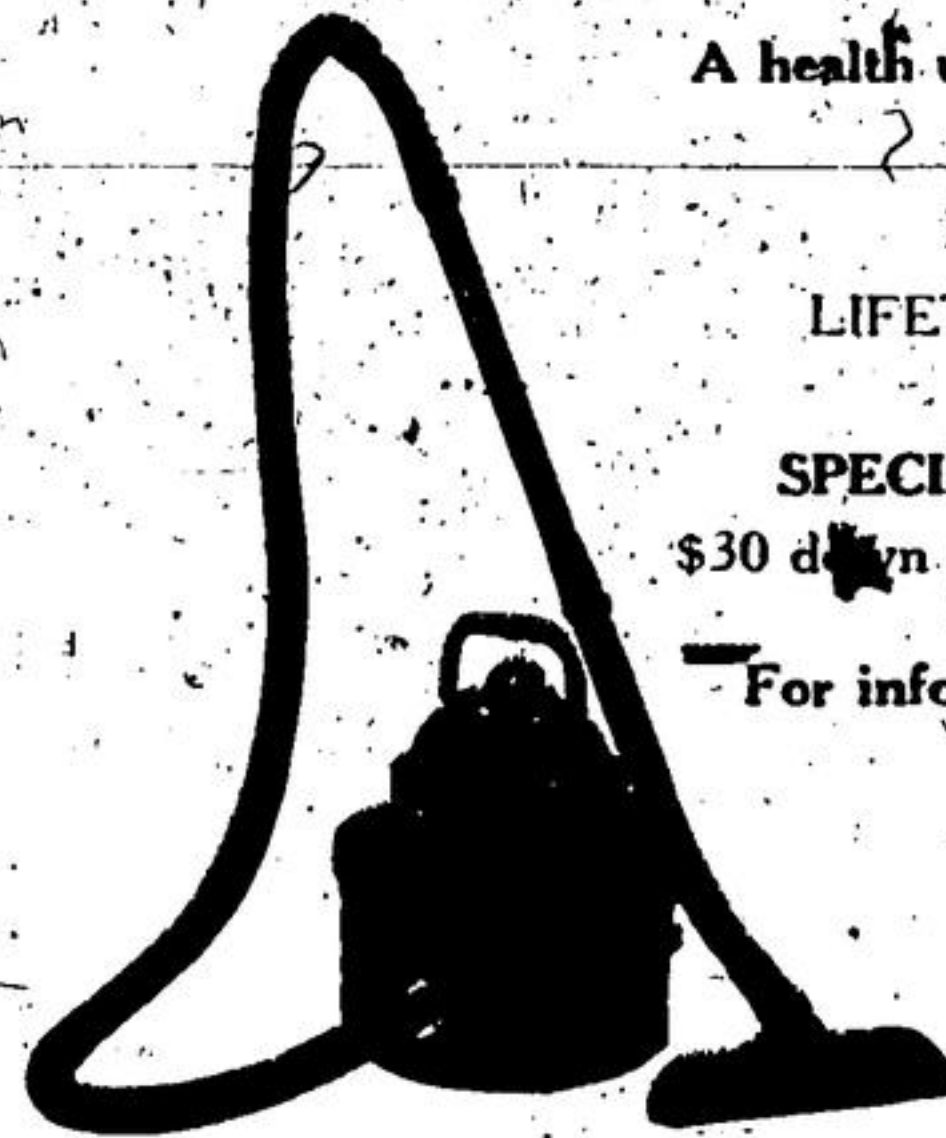
