The diet of the fox varies throughout the year. Some of the foods eaten are vegetables, mice rabbits, domestic fowl, wild fowl, chipmunks, ground squirrels, woodchucks, turtles and their eggs, grasshoppers, crickets, beetles, black berries, raspberries, strawberries, blueberries, grapes, wild cherries, apples. The fox gets some of his needed minerals by eating quantities of clay and gravel. He is also

very fond of tadpoles, frogs, and earthworms. Large dog foxes have been known to prey on young deer fawns, lambs and grown turkeys.
