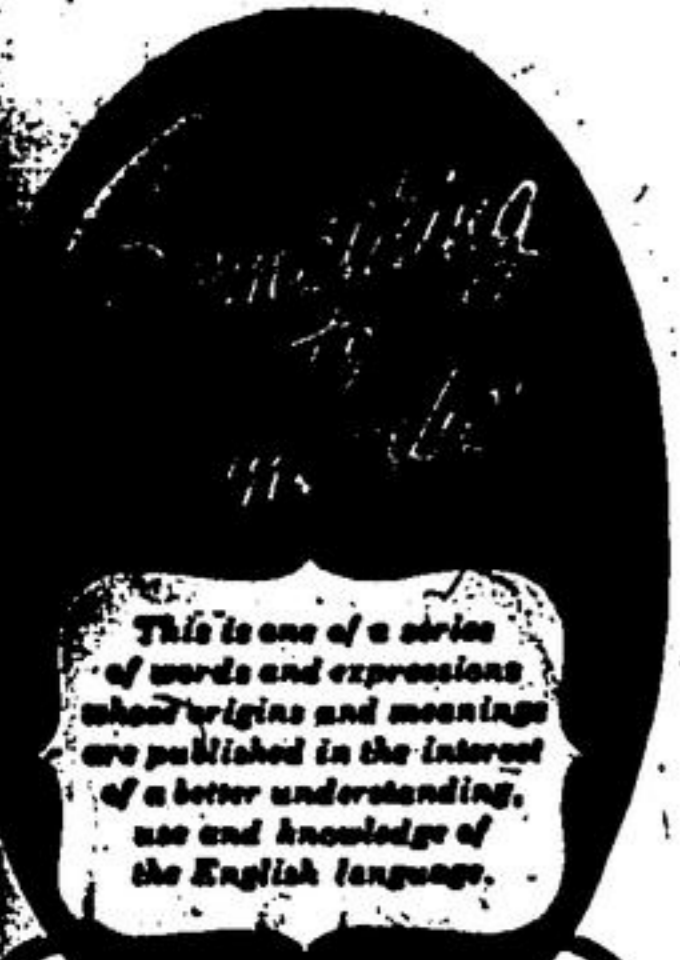
### MRS. J. FOSTER NEW Y.P.A. PRESIDENT

### THIMBLE



"Thimble", meaning a protective cover for the finger used when sewing, derives from the Anglo-Saxon *thymel*, a thumb-stall, from the Anglo-Saxon *thuma*, thumb. The *le* indicates the instrument itself, and is used commonly in our language, as in handle, from hand.

The early "thimble" was a leather covering, while the Old Norse *thimball* was the thumb of a glove. Thus the word "thimble" — so called because it was originally worn on the thumb.
