Light Vote Monday Old Council Returned

G.R.C. \$2500.00 GRANT FAVORED 2 TO 1

A light vote on Monday returned the entire 1950 town council to office for another term. Frank Petch, auctioneer and employee of the Dominion Seed House headed the polls with 597 and Garfield McGilvray, Herald foreman came second with 567. Norman Hill, grocery store proprietor and Harry Hale, Provincial Paper employee, were tied with 522 votes each. Veteran councillor Thos. L. Lyons, a retired farmer, polled 506 votes and William Tuck, also a Provincial Paper employee had 488.

In his first try for a council seat, Fred McNally, who retired on pension last year after working for many years at Provincial Paper was unsuccessful. He received 457 votes.

Other town offices had been filled by acclamation at last week's nomination meeting. Harold Cleave continues as mayor, William G. Marshall as reeve, and Kenneth MacDonald as deputy-reeve. Graham Farnell was returned as hydro commissioner and Stan Finley, Cecil McNamara and Ray Salter as public school board members.

The voters endorsed a \$2500 grant to the Recreation Commission by a vote of two to one. The grant was favoured by 516 and opposed by 267.

Only half as many voters turned out to exercise their franchise as in 1949 when election in all offices created an all-time interest in municipal politics. An estimated 840 ballots were cast this year. In 1949 over 1500 people voted.

Win Two More Raiders Undeclared

Still flying high, Georgetown Raiders defeated New Toronto Ostranders for the second time last night by a score of 14-6. It was Raiders' fourth straight win in the league schedule.

Georgetown Raiders, pick of the intermediate "A" grouping in the district administered a sizzling 15-0 defeat to Dundas when the teams met for the first time here last Friday.

Dundas showed more promise than the score would indicate, but they were confounded by a fine passing display by the seasoned local team which racked up five goals in the first period.

Jack Kemshead was scoring star of the night. He did the hat trick in the second with three in a row and added one in each of the other periods for a grand total of five. Del Beaumont rang the bell three times, as did Ferri, and singles were scored by Patterson, Junior Beaumont, Graham and Chappell.

Raiders play here Friday with Burlington and again next Tuesday with Oakville as the opponents.

Prominent Churchman Dufferin County Clerk

Lt.-Col. John A. V. Preston, county clerk in Dufferin County for more than thirty years, died Friday at his home in Orangeville in his 87th year. Lt.-Col. Preston also was registrar of the surrogate court.

Colonel Preston was a lawyer in Grand Valley before taking the county position. He served in the Northwest Rebellion and in World War I. He was a past district deputy grand master of the Masonic Order and a prominent Anglican churchman, rendering signal service on the finance committee of Niagara synod.

Colonel Preston's son, Allan, who lives in Montreal is married to the former Eleanor Beaumont of Glen Williams.

Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson represented the Bishop at the funeral service in St. Mark's Church, Orangeville on Monday morning, which was conducted by Canon E. West-McMaster. Mr. Arthur Beaumont of Glen Williams also attended the service.

Gravel Trucks Collide Highway Traffic Tie-up

Two truck drivers escaped injury when their trucks collided on the highway near the main corner in Norval early Friday afternoon.

Both trucks are owned by the White Line Trucking Service of Kitchener and Mitchell and are engaged in hauling gravel. Norman O'Donnell of Mitchell, driver of the westbound truck was proceeding towards Georgetown and applied his brakes to avoid collision with a vehicle in front. It is believed that a wheel seized and the truck swayed into the eastbound lane, colliding almost head-on with a loaded tractor trailer driven by Reginald Rintoul of Kitchener, a brother of the owner of the company.

Traffic was routed off the highway for several hours until the tractor trailer, which was astride the highway could be moved.

Both trucks were damaged considerably and damage may be about the \$2000 mark. Provincial Constable J. Bradley of Milton investigated.

Killed in Accident Quarry Foreman Funeral

A funeral service was held Saturday at the McClure Funeral Home for Robert Thomas Cain, who was killed in an accident at Sykes Quarry last Wednesday morning. Mr. Cain was struck by a falling boom when two cables snapped on a derrick while a heavy stone was being moved.

Mr. Cain was a son of the late James Cain and Mary Jane Stokes and was born at Cheltenham 51 years ago. During the first war he enlisted and served overseas with the 116th Battalion. After his return to Canada he joined the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and served in western Canada from 1919 to 1924. He had since lived near Glen Williams and had been foreman at Sykes Quarry for ten years.

He was a member of Branch 120, Canadian Legion and of the Orange Lodge. His talents at calling off for square dances were well known in the district and he often appeared in this role at parties and dances.

He is survived by his wife, Mabel H. McNally and six children, Bernice, Jimmy, Margaret, Audrey, Mariene and Lois. A brother and sister, Jack and Margaret Cain live in Georgetown, a brother Edward in Radville, Saskatchewan, and a brother Wilfred in Sault Ste. Marie. A sister, Mrs. William Davidson, predeceased him four years ago.

Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson officiated at the funeral service, and pallbearers were Alfred Sykes, Theodore Brown, Floyd Ward, Jack McQuarrie, William Hyde and Walter Hyde. Fellow members of the Legion branch attended the funeral and conducted a graveside service under the direction of branch president, David Bowman. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
