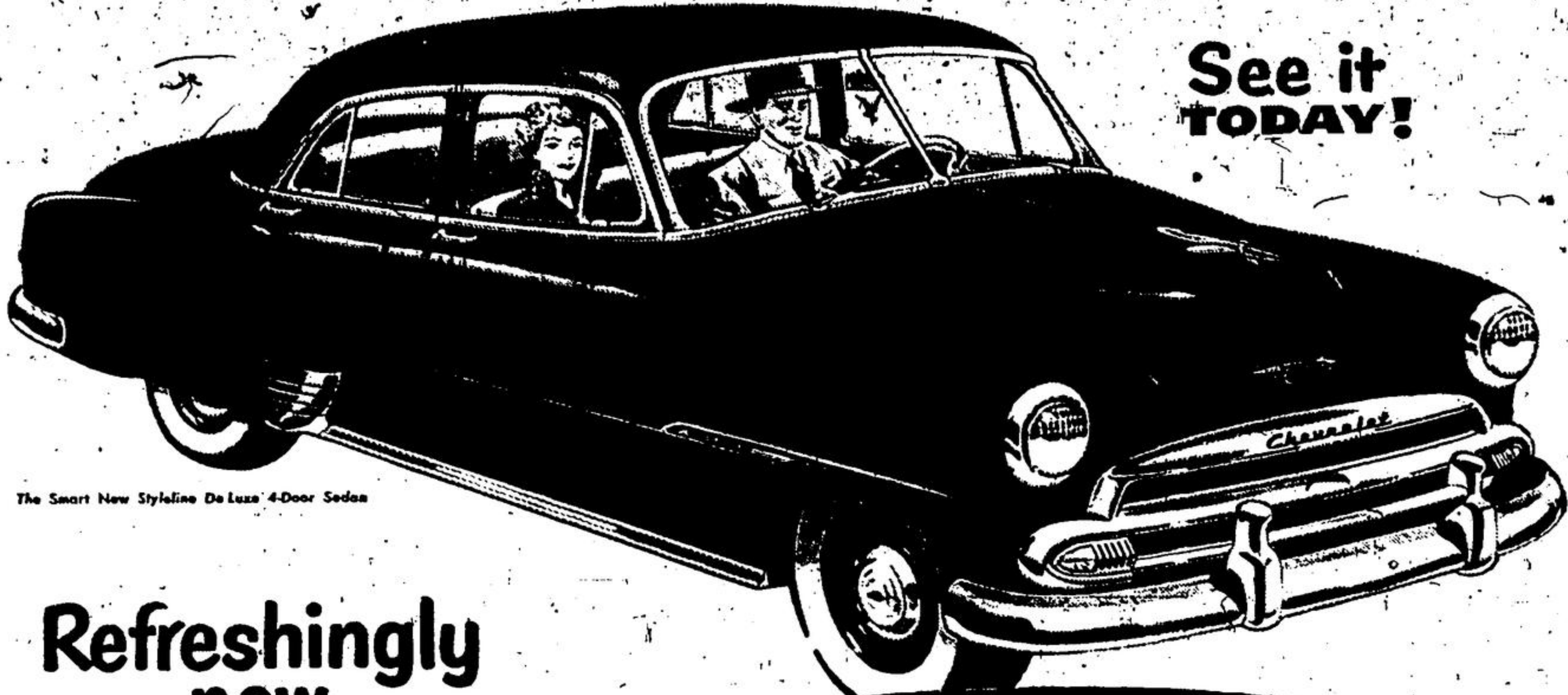

Lady Heads Polls In Acton Election

Making her first bid for public office, Miss Esther Taylor, Bell Telephone employee and news photographer whose pictures have been widely reproduced in the Toronto Globe and Mail and the Family Herald, headed the polls at Acton's municipal elections.

Miss Taylor received 831 votes, 140 more than her closest opponent in the council vote. Members of council elected are Miss Taylor, C. E. Wood, Ray Thompson, L. Wlack, J. Greer and Alf Fryer.

Robert McArthur was re-elected to the public utilities commission with a good majority over C. Rogvaldson.

Voters favoured the building of a new public school four to one. The school was approved 496 to 121.

Top offices in the town had been filled by acclamation. Ted Tyler is mayor, J. Hargrave reeve and J. Stewart deputy-reeve.

PUBLIC SCHOOL NEEDS NEW CLASSROOM IN FALL

The problem of where to put an extra class in September is faced by the Public School board. Present indications are that a new class will have to be added at the school when the fall term opens. The new public school probably will not be ready for opening by that time and capacity of the present school is already taxed to the limit. It may well be that a temporary classroom will have to be established at another location until the new building is completed.

The matter was discussed at last Wednesday's meeting of the board. Walter Biehn was reappointed as board representative to North Halton High School district board. Georgetown gets this appointment by virtue of having the largest public school attendance of any of the five municipalities comprising the district.

Hiring of Mrs. H. C. Wrigglesworth as teacher for Grade 4 was confirmed at that meeting. Mrs. Wrigglesworth started teaching the first of the month. Another appointment made was that of Miss Grace Broadfoot as supply teacher. Miss Broadfoot, who with her sister moved to town this fall, purch-
