## Memory Perpetuated In Baptistry Rail

On Sunday morning, at the beginning of the service at St. Alban's Church, Glen Williams, Archdeacon Thompson the Rector dedicated the beautiful new Baptistry-rail placed in the church in loving memory of Mrs. Sarah Norton. After opening invocation, versicle and response the dedication was made in these words: "In the faith of Jesus Christ and in loving memory of Sarah Norton, we dedicate this Baptistry rail to the glory of God and for the use of this Church; in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen." The hymn of Dedication was then sung as a processional, and the Holy Communion celebrated. Before the office hymn the Rector referred to Mrs. Norton as a faithful worshipper in St. Alban's during her lifetime, referred to the carved oak Baptistry-rail as a worthy memorial, and thanked the donors in the name of the Churchwardens, congregation, and himself, for the generous gift made to the Church.

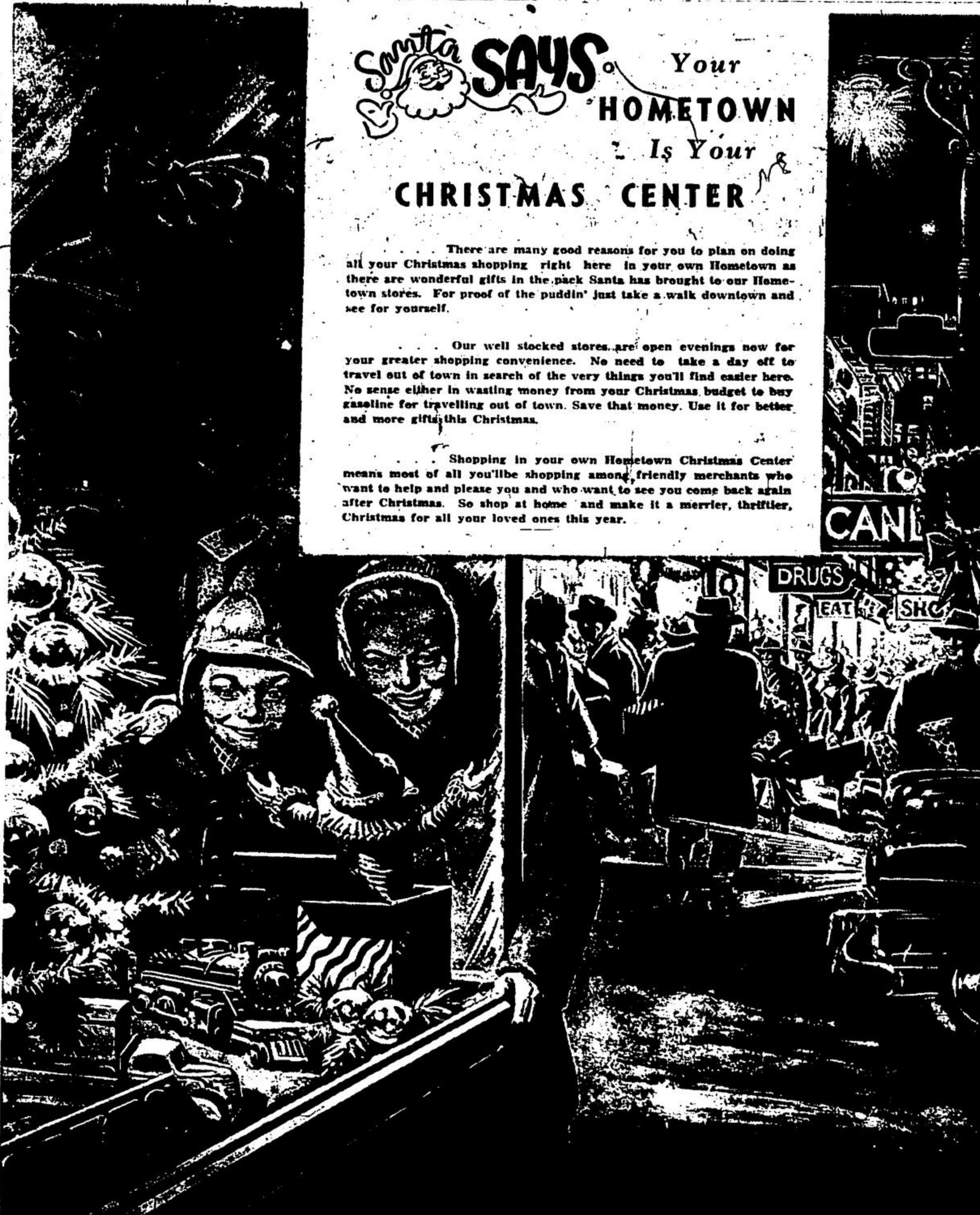

The enrolment per classroom is too high, particularly in the junior grades, Mr. Skuce pointed out and he suggested that the board make plans to alleviate this condition next year.

Present enrolment at the school is 432 making a pupil average among the eleven staff members of 39.27.
