# High School Teachers

Teachers in the high schools at Georgetown, Acton and Milton have asked for a salary adjustment in

January. The request was made by a del agation, representing all teachers at meeting of North Halton High School district board in Milton school on Monday. The teachers have asked for a \$300 yearly increase in all salaries, and a change from \$100 yearly increment to \$200. They also ask that the minimum salary be raised from \$2100 to \$3400 and the maximum from \$3500 to \$3800. Mr. R. C. Roos of Milton, spokesman for the teachers explained that the matter had been decided at a meeting of teachers and that the request had the backing of all teachers in the schools.

The school board delegated the management committee to study the question of salaries of all board employees and report at the January meeting.

Secretary Recigns

Mr. Adam Sproat of Milton, seeretary-treasurer of the board since He inception tendered his resignatien at the meeting. Mr. Sproat explained that increasing duties as Militon town clerk made it imposalble for him to do the two jobs. The board is advertising for applicants, for the position and a successor will be picked at the January meeting.

D.P. Classes On

A class of thirteen DP's has been formed to take English instruction from Mr. R. C. Roos every Monday night in Milton. It was also stated that some fifteen DP's in Acton were interested in such instruction and there is a possibility that a class will be formed there.

Inspector's Report

The report of Mr. Lakey, high school inspector, after his recent visit to the three schools was read at the meeting. Mr. Lakey praised the work of all the principals and said that the teaching standard was good in all schools. He suggested more supervision of pupils at Milton during the noon hour because of the large number who slay for lunch at school. The lack of principal's office, teachers room and gymnasium were pointed out in Georgetown as well as the need for more science equipment.

Teacher Resigns .

A letter was read from Ross Doyle of the Acton staff, asking the his resignation at the end of the term be accepted. The matter of finding a replacement teacher was left with the Acton board members.
