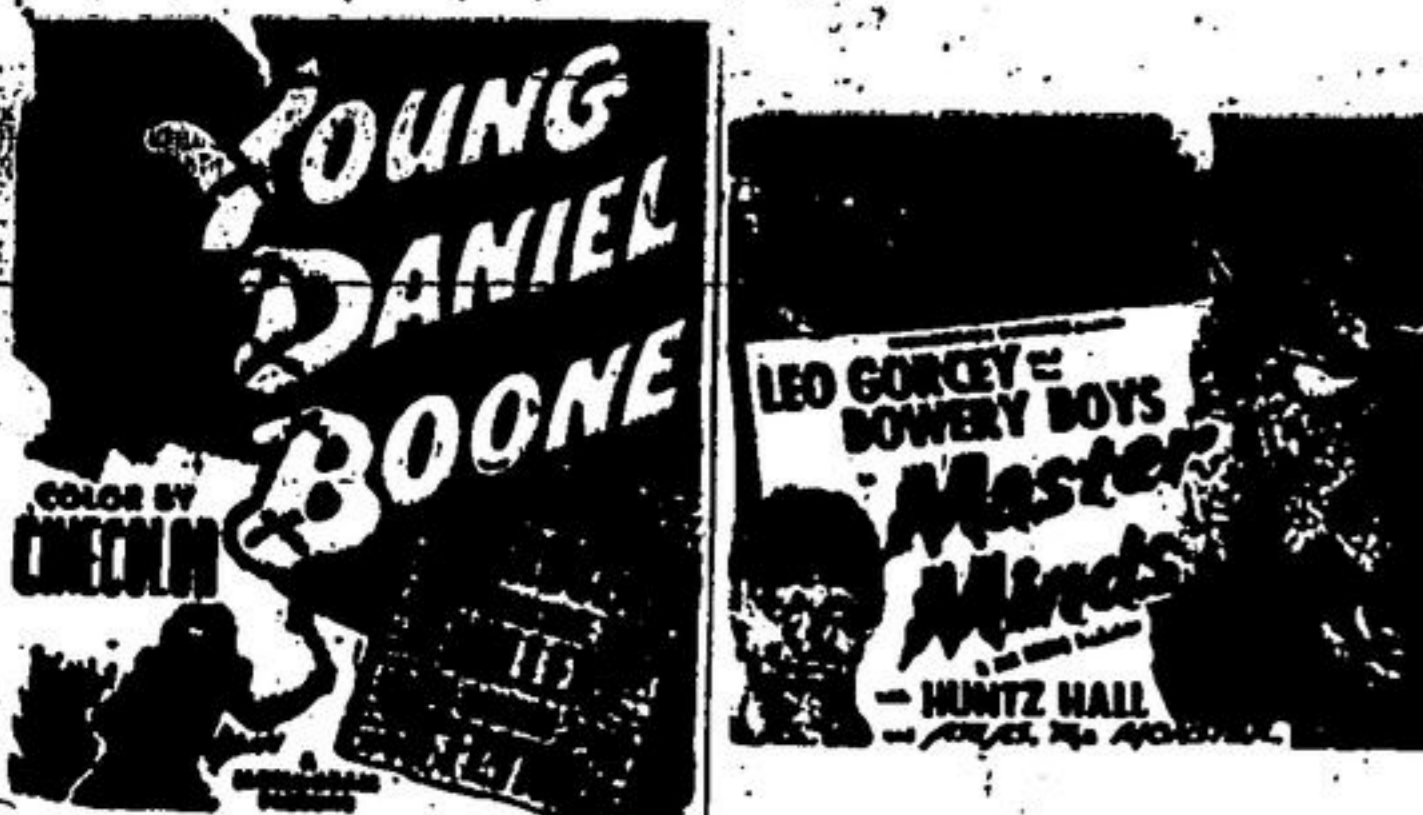

Best New Year's greetings.

I expect I am too late for Christmas greetings but we shall be thinking of you all on Christmas Day and of the Christmas Days you were able to spend with us. At the moment I am ill with a nervous collapse, but hoping soon to be able to get up and help things round here.

The weather is cold and snowy so that I am really in the best place in bed, but as you all know I would much rather be out and about, whatever the weather. This is the first letter I have been able to write so I hope you will forgive any writing which you cannot understand.

We are still "squaring our shoulders to the blues." The latest, the meat ration cut to about 7½d worth each per week — and just before Christmas, too. But I do expect someday these things will all be put right.

P.S. My doctor has just told me I need a long rest and holiday. Don't I wish I could come over and see you all. I don't know about a rest — I should be far too busy running around to see you all. Bu, boy, oh boy, what a holiday!

Dear Sir:
I would like to ask you if you would be kind enough to spare me a little space in your paper in which I can explain my complaint of December 5th to council re garbage. I'll just make this short and to the point.

I have used the same containers from 1½ to 2 years and have in that time met and talked with many of Bob Lane's drivers and not one ever made any complaint about said containers until about November 15th when Mrs. Colman was in the yard and the garbage driver saw her, and said "Hi, you, these are no garbage cans. The next time they are out they go up on top of the load!" So to make sure what he said, Mrs. Colman said "Beg your pardon" and he repeated it with an insult.
