School Board Nominees
 All three school board nominees
 spoke briefly, Hector Bird saying he
 believed the dental work done on
 public funds was having a good
 effect.
 John Bingham, school board chair-
 man, pointed out the growth from
 an original eight schools to twelve,
 with sixteen classrooms now in op-
 eration. Comparing costs with other
 similar areas, the cost per pupil is
 quite low, he said.
 One School Mere Ecclesiastical
 Lt. Col. Gordon Brown spoke for
 the high school district board and
 said that the district had been form-
 ed with the idea of having one
 central high school in place of the
 present three and that this would
 give the best education more eco-
 nomically. Eight of the eleven board
 members favoured one school at
 Speyside. He estimated that to
 operate two schools rather than one
 would cost at least fifty per cent
 more.
 On Wednesday, the board inter-
 viewed department officials in Tor-
 onto and ironed out certain diffi-
 culties" said Col. Brown. "We came
 away with their opinion that the
 solution of secondary education in
 north Halton is one central school.
 That, I think, will happen if we
 don't get politics mixed up in it."
 The central school issue might be
 clouded for a time by the Hope re-
 port on education which had just
 been issued, was Col. Brown's opin-
 ion.

Collect Federation Fee
 The question of collecting mem-
 bership fees for the Federation of
 Agriculture drew some spirited dis-
 cussion from ratepayers at the meet-
 ing. A motion to have these col-
 lected by a lump payment from
 township funds was made by R. L.
 Davidson and F. D. Charles and
 passed by a majority vote.
 R. S. Heatherington, field man for
 the federation explained the value
 of Federation activities, pointing
 out such things accomplished as im-
 proved dairy herds, medical ser-
 vice, car insurance and a floor on
 butter and egg prices. The fee col-
 lection should not be looked upon
 as a grant, he said. Any farmer who
 objected to the payment could claim
 a rebate if he so desired.
 Ieave Currie objected to the
 idea, saying he did not believe it
 was legal to proceed in this way,
 particularly as there were many
 township residents who do not farm
 and who should not have to pay a
 federation fee.
 Mr. Currie, in his concluding re-
 marks, said the matter of township
 participation in the Grand River
 Conservation Authority is causing
 him concern. Thirteen hundred and
 twenty acres of Esqueping land in
 the Crewe's Corners district is in-
 cluded in the authority and he is
 afraid that the ratepayers concerned
 are going to have some heavy bills
 if they continue in the Authority.
 Next year's council, should check
 into this and see if there is any pos-
 sibility of withdrawing, he advised.
