### TAKES NEW POSITION WITH ACTON CAR FIRM

Our New Year's column last week "missed the boat," so maybe you will want to file some of these ideas away for reference next holiday season.

Decorate the windows to make the party more secluded. We suggest you mix 2 tablespoons Epsom salts with 3 tablespoons water, and, using a small piece of cellulose sponge, dab it on your two front windows. In about half an hour there will be frosted panes. Then outline trees and a snowman, etc., by sketching with the rubber end of a pencil. By the way, we have never had much effect from using vegetable colouring to moisten the salts and remind you that you may stain the pastel paint on the window frames with the colouring.

Did you know that pine incense sprinkled in one deep ash tray makes a pleasant atmosphere for non-smokers and a festive aroma. The centerpiece for your table may be the large sandwich tray with a grapefruit in the middle. Cut the grapefruit in the morning using the same method as you do for a radish rose, then turn upside down in a small bowl filled full of ice water coloured deep red. Use the grapefruit to hold the toothpicks spearing olives, gherkins and tiny onions.

For zippy canapes mix 1 pound chopped pecans with 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce and a dash of cayenne. Heat over boiling water until hot and spread on triangles of toast or crisp wafers.

Suggestions for festive sandwich fillings:

1. Scrambled eggs with chives; Beat 4 eggs with 4 tablespoons milk and add 1 teaspoon chives. Cook over low heat with 2 tablespoons bacon fat in the pan.
  2. Cheese and sardine: Melt 1 cup grated old cheese with 1/4 cup milk and 1 tablespoon chili sauce. Meanwhile butter trimmed rectangles of bread. On these pieces lay small sardines. Then spoon the cheese sauce over the fish.
  3. Prune and nut: Stone and chop cooked prunes, then mix with chopped walnuts.
- Turkey: Dice cold turkey, seasoned with celery salt and minced gherkins.
- Added to the sandwich tray may be wenger rolls filled with tuna salad and cut in two-inch pieces, small cheese tea biscuits or finger rolls stuffed with lobster paste.
- Now for an attractive holiday dessert! Mince-meat tarts are hearty and can be made to suit the occasion by laying a piece of pastry, cutout with a bell or star cookie cutter, on the tarts before the baking. Warm, before serving to bring out the mellow flavour. On the smooth soft side of the palate there are desserts like Rainbow Jelly-filled Fruit, Ice Cream Sundae, or Seafoam Refrigerator Cake.

#### Seafoam Refrigerator Cake

- 1/2 lb. marshmallows
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
  - 1/2 cup crushed drained pineapple
  - 1 cup cream, whipped
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 8 graham crackers
  - 8 large ginger snaps
- Cut marshmallows and add to milk in double boiler. Cook until melted, stirring until smooth. Cool. Fold in walnuts, pineapple, salt and vanilla. Roll crackers and snaps to fine crumbs. Place half the crumbs in a 6-inch refrigerator pan or two ice cube trays. Pour marshmallow mixture over crumbs. Top with remaining crumbs. Place in refrigerator overnight. Cut into squares. Serve with whipped cream. Makes 9 servings.

#### The Punch Bowl

Nothing like a spicy drink on a frosty night served steaming hot from the bowl: Simmer two quarts grape juice or cider with 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon whole allspice, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and a few whole cloves for 15 minutes. Remove spices, add brandy, flavoured and oranges slices. Serve hot.

However if you want to see the look of pleasant surprise watch your friends as they sip a blend of chocolate and coffee. Melt 1/2 pound Christmas seals on it, or the old-fashioned cooking chocolate over hot fashioned crock on which you in-water then add 1 cup strong coffee, scribe "Happy New Year" using a pen. Scald 6 cups milk and stir in nail polish.
