Flood Still Serious **Blasting Helps Some**

Little improvement is shown in the flood situation at Glen Williams since last week. Houses along the Glen Road on the river side are still surrounded by water and practically every basement in the district is flooded. Some people have not been able to have their furnaces on since the flood began a week and a half ago.

Mr. Jolley had a most interesting career as a railway chef, working 43 years on the private car system of the Canadian Pacific Railways. President A. W. Norton was in During that time he had served many famous personages including such members of the Royal Family as the Duke of Windsor (then Prince of Wales), the Duke of Kent, Duke of Gloucester and King George and Queen Elizabeth on their 1939 tour of the Dominion. Lord Beaverbrook, Winston Churchill, Earl and Lady Haig and members of the Japanese royal family were among the many visitors who travelled on the rail-

way during his term of service. Mr. Jolley was born in Wellington, New Zealand. During his service with the railway he lived in Montreal. Retiring in 1942, he moved to Acton in 1944 and then to Norval He had catered on several occasions for parties and fraternal gatherings in the district.
