ROD AND GUN

The weather has been very good lately for hunting and by all reports the hunters have been out in force. They report the jackrabbit and cottontail more numerous. Bob Lockhart got five foxes and two jacks in a week. Charlie Sheppard of Terra Cotta shot two foxes Monday morning within three minutes. The European hare or jackrabbit as he is called here, was brought to Canada from Germany, shortly before the first war and was kept in captivity at Bow Park, Brantford. Some escaped from there in winter and spread over the province. As they are very difficult to keep in captivity there is no doubt this single escape in the source of all our stock in Ontario. They have been scarce in recent years, being apparently subject to the same variation in numbers as native rabbits.

Forest Fires
Figures compiled by the government show that in 1949 there were 62 fires caused by hunters in the deer season and only 20 last year. Acreage of 60,065 was burned in 1834 fires in 1949. Last year 985 fire destroyed 38,780 acres. Precipitation during the hunting season, has, of course, a direct bearing on the number of fires.

Fish Distribution
The government restocking program for fish is no small one as we can see from figures for the last fiscal year when a total of well over 383 million fish were placed in streams. Included in this total were two million small mouth bass, half a million large mouth bass, 6 1/2 million lake trout, 406,000 brown trout and 313 million pickerel. Trout may contract twenty or more diseases, but happily only half of these, primarily ulcers and gill disease are common.

Game Warden Visits
Dudley Hitchcock of Oakville, Halton game warden, has been visiting the district and we understand he has been checking on gun licence holders. Hunters are reminded that they need not only the proper gun licence but also a township hunting licence, which allows them to shoot pheasants in season and foxes and rabbits the rest of the season.
