She was a member of the Quarter Century Club of the company. She was 78 years of age.

Predeceased by two sisters and a brother, she was the last member of her family. Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service last Wednesday at the McClure Funeral Home with interment following in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were W. G.
