**Full House for Raiders
At Wingham Game**

Beat Walkerton 16-12 — Coach, Players Appear on
Tory Gregg Broadcast.

The drive through a variety of weather which included rain, snow,
fog, sleet, and muddy, rutted roads, didn't dampen the enthusiasm of
hockey team and fans in a good will trip to Wingham on Saturday.

This year had been invited by Tory Gregg to play an exhibition
game with Walkerton Merchants, an intermediate "B" entry coached by
Doug Runions, former Raiders mentor who brought an intermediate "A"
championship to Georgetown three years ago. Runions is now operating a
hotel at Neustadt.

Proof that the Raiders' fame had
spread far beyond Georgetown was
shown when the arena began to fill
an hour before game time. Every
seat was filled, with paid admissions
near the 1800 mark. As someone
said after the game "Strange that
we have to drive a hundred miles
to play to a full house."

Raiders on the Air

Highlight of the trip for three of
the local boys was their appearance
as guests on Tory Gregg's popular
sports broadcast. Tory, a Paisley
native who not so long ago had his
share of applause as a hockey pro.
is first vice president of the O.H.A.
and Mr. Wingham himself when it
comes to sports in that district. He
is well known here where each year
he comes to emcee the fall fair.

Tory's 6:15 broadcast is beamed
over a wide area of western Onta-
rio and in honour of the occasion
he stretched the usual fifteen-min-
utes by five in order to give his
guests lots of time for their com-
ments. Ken McMillan, who helped
arrange the trip from this end and
coach Kenny Braithwaite also had
a niche in the program.

Royally Entertained

The facilities of the Hotel Brun-
swick were taxed to capacity in the
royal welcome extended to the vis-
itors.

At a banquet preceding the game,
players and their wives, pipe band
members and hockey club execu-
tives overflowed into the main lob-
by where a hastily-erected dining
table served the excess crowd. Al-
together 81 people enjoyed the hos-
pitality extended by the arena man-
agement.

Following the game, the hotel was
taken over by the Georgetown-
ers augmented by fans who had
made the trip to see the game, and
the Walkerton players and club of-
ficials, and all enjoyed a buffet
lunch, again provided by the Wingham
management.

Pipe Band Plays

Adding colour to the evening,
Georgetown Girls Pipe Band played
between periods. A scheduled march
to the arena was cancelled because
of the heavy downpour, but the girls
made up for it with their music at
the game and were roundly cheered
each time they appeared with Drum
Major Margaret Sargent leading
them through their formations on the
ice.

Free Scoring Game

The game will not go down in
history as a world beater.
It was a free scoring affair in
which Walkerton held the lead
briefly twice in the first few min-
utes before the smoother Raiders
aggregation piled up a four goal
lead which they held through the
game.

Doug Runions was a one-man ball
of fire and almost equalled Bucko
McDonald by staying on the ice
most of the game — no small feat
for a man who has been voting for
as many years as the same Mr.
Runions, especially when you
realize that he was playing a wing
position. Walkerton has a good
club and should go far in "B" com-
petition this year. The team plays
the Runions style of every man
down the ice for power plays and
and these paid off on several occa-
sions. That they didn't more often
was due to the good work of young
Fred Lawrence in goal. He played
a good game and most of the goals
which got past him were labelled
"Go" in fact, were scored on flukes
off Georgetown players' skates.

Four minor penalties were handed
out by referee Charlie Webster and
Locking and Norm Locking of
Port Elgin. It was as clean a con-
test as you can find in intermediate
hockey, due partly to the fact that
no one can take an exhibition match
too seriously, but also because the
players on both teams are all good
sports and play for the game's sake.

The best Georgetown efforts were
a Nash-Kemshead combination late
in the second period and a lovely
goal by Del Beaumont from brother
Junior and Kemshead in the third
period. Max Bradbury and Rene
Martin, still on the injured list
made the trip but watched the
game from the balcony. The Raiders
were bolstered for the evening by
Gord Cruikshank, a Brampton
lad who had a try-out this year
with Hamilton and Graham Hastings
who hails from up Toronto way.
Both gave a good account of them-
selves in the scoring.

Coach Asks Support

Speaking on the radio show, coach
Braithwaite said last year's record
of 33 wins without a loss was a re-
cord in O.H.A. circles and remarked
that the Toronto papers had been
lax in not giving the proper pub-
licity to the team.

This year he thinks Milton will
be the toughest nut for Georgetown
to crack, even though we have won
all games with them to date.

After the game, Braithwaite cor-
nered your reporter in the hotel
lobby and asked that a special plea
be made for better attendance at
the games in Georgetown. Undoubt-
edly the best team ever to grace
Georgetown ice, the Raiders have
not been getting the support they
deserve this year at the turnstiles.
Aside from the financial picture,
which is not too rosy, the team needs
the moral support of well-filled
houses to play their best.
