Warns Children Not To Walk on Tracks

Corporal H. Markle, a CNR constable from Kitchener, visited the various classes in the school on Thursday afternoon. He addressed them on "Railway Safety." His very impressive talk was accompanied by enlarged photographs which revealed to the listeners the tragedies that accompany railway accidents. He urged the children not to walk on the tracks and not to cross where there were "No Trespassing" signs. It is hoped the parents will endorse his exhortations and urge children to walk and cross on safest routes.

The fifth issue of "Grade Eight" has been published. It has proven to be of great interest to the class, and has already raised about \$12.00 for the Red Cross Funds of Mr. H. Henry's class. It provides pleasant English practice for that senior grade.

Books have been closed for sale of Christmas cards and stationery in Grade VIII. These record \$125 worth sold, with a net profit of \$50.00 for the class. They plan to spend this later in the term for a class excursion.

These films were borrowed from the Ontario Agricultural College Library, Guelph. Sets of pictures are shown bi-monthly; one set of films shown to seniors and one set to juniors each month, if possible. The Juniors have seen "Children of Holland" and "Care of Pets."

Georgetown Public School boys' hockey team met Georgetown High School boys' team on Wednesday afternoon in one of the most exciting juvenile games of the season. Ronald Ritchie and Richard Sienko acted as referees for the game which resulted 6-3 in favour of the GPS boys.
