Salary raises averaging \$300 cach Were given to telenter at the

town Public School when the ary schedule was revised at at board meeting last Thursday.

The new schedule calls for minimum of \$1800 and maximum of \$2700, with an annual increment of \$100 during the first three years of teaching and \$200 a year thereafter. A teacher receives an additional \$75 yearly if a specialist certificate is used and \$100 if a teacher possesses a university degree.

New teachers joining the staff are entitled to \$50 for each year of experience up to six years. In other words a new teacher's salary can be as high as \$2100 to start providing there is the proper experience.

The principal's salary schedule calls for a \$3000 minimum and \$4000 maximum with yearly increment of \$150 for the first three years and \$200 after that.

The \$300 raises absorbed a cost of living bonus of \$100 which had previously been paid. Three members of the staff who have long service were given an additional \$100 raise when the salary revisions were made. -
