Those who produce high quality milk should be compensated by being paid a premium price according to quality.

Two-thirds of the producers would be required to make pooling successful.

In determining the quality of the milk, grading should be done according to butter fat and bacterial count, done by a government grader. The grader should be paid by the government.

**Rev. Percival Mayes Moving to Cayuga, Here 25 Years Ago**

A former Georgetown minister, Rev. Percival Mayes has been appointed rector of St. John's Church, Cayuga. Mr. Mayes was rector of St. George's Church of England here before going to Niagara Falls 25 years ago.

Mr. Mayes will preach his last sermon at All Saints on Easter Day and will assume his new appointment in Cayuga on April 1st. It will be his sixth appointment in the 40 years since he was ordained at the Cathedral at Sault Ste. Marie. He has been rector at churches in Gravenhurst, Guelph and Hamilton.

In Niagara Falls, Mr. Mayes will leave an impressive list of accomplishments. In 1931 he helped to found St. Martin's Church and fostered it through fifteen years until it was made a separate parish in 1948. Extensive remodeling and building programs on the parish hall have been completed, during his stay there and the church has received many memorial gifts.

He has been president for eighteen years of the Lundy's Lane Historical Society and a past president of the Ontario Society. He is also an
