A Training School for the Leaders of the Homemaking Club unit. "The Club Girl Entertains", was held on Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 29th and 30th, in the Farmer's Bldg. Milton. This unit is the Spring project selected by the junior girls of Halton County and is presented under the auspices of the Women's Institute Branch; Department of - Agriculture Ten leaders from six ciuos in Halton County were present at this two day training sc

In this unit the principles of hospitality and good manners were covered, along with the duties of the hostess and of the guest at a formal or informal tea, a party or club activity, or over a week-end. Invitations and acceptances - both formal and informal, were discussed, and suggestions for party decorations and menus were given, including a demonstration of fancy sandwiches. Tuesday afternoon the leaders presided at a formal afternoon tea. Table setting and service and table manners were also covered in this unit. The leaders will now organize a club in their own community, and will hold from eight to ten meetings during the coming months. The girls participating in this activity will then exhibit and participate in activities at the Achievment Day in June. All girls between the ages of 12 and 26 are eligible to participate in this club activity.
