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Brampton Man Injured Car Over Embankment

James Hillson, 23, of Brampton suffered shock, several facial lacerations and a dislocated shoulder in an accident on the Norval hill Saturday night.

The accident occurred 100 yards below the spot where a Toronto man narrowly missed a similar fate last week. Mr. Hillson lost control of his car after an auto going in the opposite direction forced him off the side of the road. His car plunged fifteen feet down a hill and lodged in some trees. It was badly wrecked.

The driver was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, for treatment of his injuries.

Speaker Tells of European Visit

On Friday afternoon, February 23rd, the Georgetown Women's Institute had as guest speaker Mrs. J. E. Houck of Brampton. Mrs. Houck is Citizenship Convener of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada and had attended the conference of Federated Women of the World, or International Association of Rural Women, which was held in Copenhagen, Denmark, in September of last year.

Mrs. Houck delighted her audience with a vivid description of her trip through the various countries. She told of the stately grandeur of England and the bonny hills of Scotland. Right here she interspersed a plea for food, especially meat, for Britain. As a unit would we still continue to send parcels. The present flu epidemic in Britain, doctors say, was, if not caused, at least allowed to progress because of the lack of proteins in the diet.

She spoke of Norway and its friendly, hospitable, and patriotic people, of Sweden and especially of Stockholm and its 200,000 bicycles, where you really felt apologetic if you owned a motor car, of France and its architecture, but her disappointment in the apparent unpopularity of her people. Then of Denmark where the conference was held.

There were eight hundred delegates from twenty-two of twenty-three different countries. The different native costumes were colorful and the great array of flags very picturesque. Denmark is a very beautiful country and noted for its agriculture. The grey green of its forests is not an artist's imagination but a living reality. Copenhagen is a very clean city. She spoke of brotherhood, as man to man, and woman to woman, each one having his responsibility. To learn to say "This is right and We Stand By It." And as so often said before Canada with her great possibilities was a country of whom we could justly be proud and one to whom the weary traveller was glad to come home.

Members from the Institutes of Norval, Stewarttown and Ashgrove were in attendance as well as many friends from town. Mrs. H. C. Bailey, the president of Georgetown Women's Institute, was chairman. Mrs. Wm. T. Sinclair introduced the speaker and Mrs. W. A. Grant moved a vote of thanks to the speaker and those taking part in the programme and especially to the managers of Knox Presbyterian Church for so kindly allowing the Institute the use of their basement.

Mrs. E. G. Bishop, accompanied by Mrs. J. E. Barber, sang two pleasing folk songs; and Misses Eileen Punt and Marilyn Bell played two piano duets. The ladies of the Institute served a delicious tea at the close.
