

## What Council Did

ON MONDAY, MARCH 5th

Will prepare an agreement with the Esqueing Agricultural Society for the erection of a building by the society in the park. (Moved by Hill and Petch). Nelson Robinson, fair president, explained the details of the new building to council. It will be constructed of cement blocks, and will be 28 ft. wide, 30 ft. long and 10 ft. high. It is designed to house sheep, hogs and horses on fair day and will be used for storing fair property during the year. It will be located in the vicinity of the present sheep pens at the south end of the park.

Told William McDonald, Maple Avenue, that council would get in touch with K. M. Langdon when he returns from Florida to settle the dispute about town sewers being laid through Mr. McDonald's property without permission. Mr. McDonald said he had waited three years and is getting anxious for a settlement.

Bob Lane asked for a \$25 weekly increase in the garbage collection contract, which would bring it to \$4200 a year. This will be discussed at the budget meeting later this month.

Told A. M. Baxter and Jim Martin, representing the GRC, to submit their budget before the next meeting in order to have their grant discussed. In answer to a question, Mr. Martin said arrangements have been made for Mr. Baxter to carry on as recreational director for the first 6 months of this year until some permanent arrangement is made. Activities at present being planned are hockey night, hobby show, and Stay-at-Home Camp.

Ordered 3000 feet of 8" transite pipe to be used for a water extension to the College View district. (Moved by Hale and MacDonald). A delegation from the two paper mills asked at the meeting when the system would be installed and were told it would be put in as soon as ground conditions are suitable.

Were given assessment figures which will be used in 1951 for the county levy on municipalities. The amounts were fixed by Judge W. N. Robinson after an appeal by Burlington and Oakville against the old equalized assessment.

## Local Ladies Buy Mount Pleasant Church

PLAN CRAFT STUDIO, TEA ROOM WHEN OLD BUILDING IS RENOVATED

Negotiations for the purchase of Mount Pleasant Church, have been completed by two Georgetown ladies, Mrs. D. R. McLaughlin and Mrs. M. H. Moyer.

The ladies plan to use the building to house a new industry, Kirk-Kraft Studio which will produce and sell handicraft products. It is believed that this may be the only such venture in Ontario where handicraft is produced on a large scale and sold direct to the public. The new business will operate as both a wholesale and retail organization.

A tea room will be operated in conjunction with the handicraft studio and gift shop. Remodelling of the building will begin in the early spring and it is expected that the new business will open, sometime this summer.

Mount Pleasant Church, which is midway between Norval and Brampton, was part of the United charge administered by a resident minister at Norval until it was closed three or four years ago. Established in the early 1800s, the original building was destroyed by fire in 1924 and the present red brick structure was built the following year.

Mrs. Moyer and Mrs. McLaughlin have been actively interested in craft work for several years. Mrs. Moyer, who moved to town from Toronto about ten years ago, is the founder of the Georgetown Arts and Crafts, an organization which has had a phenomenal growth and now has a large membership of town and district ladies with a branch in Acton. Mrs. McLaughlin has been a district resident for about seven years since her husband purchased Miradon Farm, the former home of Lt. Col. and Mrs. D. H. C. Mason.

## Schertzl Stellar Role Hershey This Season

When Hershey traded Roly McLennahan to the Buffalo Blues for Ray Garlepp as the American Hockey League season got under way, the Bear fans cast a critical eye on the deal, recalling Roly's uncanny ability to score goals last season. Roly, it will be remembered, set a new scoring record for AHL defensemen to shoot at, banging home 25 markers for the last place Bears. His feat was rewarded by league scribes, who voted him a place on the AHL All Stars.

The season was only a few days advanced, however, when "Chocolate Town" fans "discovered" they had a new champion in Joe Schertzl, buried recruit from the Tulsa Oilers of the United States Hockey League. Big Joe not only demonstrated his ability to put the puck into opposition nets, but he developed one of the hardest shots in the league. When he lets go from 30 and 40 feet out, the rubber disc fairly zings through the air and past bewildered enemy net minders.



Joe Schertzl will tell you he is more interested in seeing Hershey reach the American Hockey League playoffs than he is about any personal glory.

"I never thought anything about getting a lot of goals when the season began," he says, "but after a while when the puck kept hitting the net with regularity, I felt that maybe I'd have a chance at the record. It would be nice to break the mark but I'd rather see the team win the Calder Cup instead."

Adequate testimony as to Joe's ability to hit the twine is his record of 15 goals in 42 games, most of which were banged in from 25 feet and further out. In addition, he has assisted in the scoring of 14 other goals.

In spite of his scoring record Joe is not point hungry. The rugged forward, who tips the scales at 200 pounds, is always in position to do defense chore when enemy forwards start up the ice. He is fast for his size and knows how to use his weight, as well as his stick, in breaking up enemy attacks.

Joe is a likely prospect for AHL All Star honours when loop sports-writers and broadcasters begin casting about for prospective candidates on their ballots. Joe previously won a place on the United States Hockey League's All Star team in 1948-49.

A native of Budapest, Hungary, big Joe is 28 years of age. He was spotted as a possible professional candidate while playing with the Boston Olympics in 1946. He turned pro in 1947, joining the Hershey Bears, with whom he appeared in 53 games. The next two seasons he spent with the Tulsa Oilers.

When Tulsa joined the Bears and the Boston Bruins at the Hershey Sports Arena for training this last fall, Johnny Crawford, new coach of the Bears, claimed Joe for his defense corps. And rising to the occasion, big Joe has developed rapidly under Crawford's coaching. Genial John, himself one of the greatest rearguards in National League annals, has taught Joe all the tricks of the trade, and Schertzl, on the strength of his play, has proven an apt pupil.

Joe who lives in Norval during the off-season, is married and has one child, a boy. He keeps in condition for his arduous duties as a hockey player by farming during the off-season.
