Daughter of Early Georgetown Doctor

Member of an old Georgetown family, Mrs. William S. Bletcher was buried in Greenwood Cemetery on Monday after a graveside service conducted by Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson. C. H. Barber, W. F. Bradley, Everett Cole and Mrs. Bletcher's grandson, Robert Barber of Toronto acted as pallbearers.

Mrs. Bletcher died at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto on Friday. She had been in ill health since breaking her hip in a fall some time ago.

She was the former Agnes C. Freeman, daughter of the late Dr. William F. Freeman and Frances Cobban, and was born in Georgetown where her father had his medical office in the residence at the corner of Church and Market Streets where Thomas Sykes now lives.

She married the late Robert R. Barber, son of one of the Barber brothers who established the paper industry in Georgetown. They moved from here to Port Credit in 1912 where he died in 1918.

Following her marriage to the late William Bletcher, she made her home in Port Hope. Mrs. Bletcher was a member of St. George's Church of England during her residence here.

She is survived by one son W. Brock Barber of Toronto, three grandchildren and one great-grandchild. A son, Fil. Hunt Cyril R. Barber was killed in 1918, while serving with the Royal Naval Air Service. She was predeceased also by one brother, Dr. William Freeman.
