**AT ESQUESING COUNCIL**

ON MONDAY, MARCH 5th

Esquensing council feels that the amount of the township's liability for high school costs places an undue burden on the ratepayers. A motion was passed that the council apply to the North Halton High School District board for an arbitration of the division of liability between the five municipalities which comprise the district.

A tender from Peel Construction Company was accepted for supplying, crushing and delivering 10,000 yards of gravel, subject to the approval of the Dept. of Highways.

A deputation of ratepayers from Glen Williams, asked that steps be taken this summer to avoid flood conditions such as have existed this year.

A letter from E. L. Taylor complained of the condition of some of the township roads, and asked if steps can be taken during the spring and summer to rectify this.

Tax refunds were made to Norman Douglas, \$20.12, barn burned and John Randall, \$8.97, taxes paid twice. A number of taxes were written off, including: Credit Valley Lime, no business, \$36; Tom Dickenson, business assessment, \$5; James Norton, 1949 business assessment, \$3; Gordon Bridgen, \$2.25, property assessed twice.

William Hulls was appointed by by-law as building inspector for the township.

Salary increases were made to the clerk and treasurer and the car allowance of the assessor increased. Salary increases are also contemplated for the assessor and road superintendent.

A. W. Benton will be appointed assessment commissioner and K. C. Lindsay assessor when the necessary by-laws are prepared.

**Pioneer Family Came From Tipperary, Ireland**

Last member of a pioneer district family, Mrs. John W. Hustler died at her home, lot 1, concession 6, Chinguacousy on Saturday in her 82nd year.

Mrs. Hustler was the former Harriet Alice Cowan. Her father, Joseph, was one of a family of nine who left Clonroagh County, Tipperary, Ireland in 1831 and made a six-week crossing in a sailing vessel to make their new home in Canada.

There is a legend that the Cowan family originally were in Cowan Heath, Scotland and during Cromwell's time in the seventeenth century some of the family fought with the Ironsides. Descendants of these remained in northern Ireland until 1800 when two brothers, John and Edward moved to southern Ireland. It was John's widow, with her family, of nine, who settled in Chinguacousy.

St. Stephen's Church, Hornby, was built in 1837 by pioneers including members of the Cowan family. Mrs. Hustler's father and mother walked from her home near the church to be the second couple married in the church where planks were still used for seats. Mrs. Hustler was the last and youngest of fourteen members of her family. She followed a simple creed to make the best of things and put her faith in God.

Rev. James E. Maxwell conducted the funeral service yesterday in St. Stephen's Church with interment in the adjoining cemetery. Predeceased by her husband, John W. Hustler, she is survived by three children, James of Bramford, Mary of Hamilton and Mrs. F. McDonald (Florence), of Ancaster.

**THE MIXING BOWL**

Hello Homemakers. This is always a difficult time of year for the homemaker who likes to serve fresh vegetables yet seriously tries to keep within the limits of a food budget.

Many inviting imported vegetables are available for those who are not on a slim budget, while our winterized storage vegetables do not look as appetizing. The best way to overcome this in-between season is to make use of canned vegetables and, when possible, combine a canned one with a fresh vegetable. Canned diced carrots with fresh cooked celery or canned peas with cubed turnips are interesting and full of flavour if the canned ones are only heated hot and mixed with the fresh cooked ones at the last minute.

To make the best of old potatoes prepare them as scalloped or creamed with a little diced onion. Then too, potatoes whipped creamy with milk and lightly seasoned with nutmeg tend to take a new lease on life.

This is also the time of year to serve your own home-canned fruit and vegetables. Upside-Down-Cake, Fruit Gingerbread or Fruit Casserole with a biscuit or pastry topping provide a hearty dessert that is economical too.

**Tomatoes and New Cabbage**  
2 cups canned tomatoes  
3 cups shredded cabbage  
1 tsp. sugar  
Dash of pepper  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tbsps flour  
2 tbsps. butter

Cook the shredded cabbage in a small amount of boiling salt water for 7 minutes. Drain cabbage. Pour 1/4 cup liquid from tomatoes and stir into sugar, salt, pepper, and flour. Add the remainder of the tomatoes to the cabbage and heat to simmering. Blend in the flour paste and cook until thickened. Add butter and serve. Makes 6 servings.

**Parsnips with Tomato Sauce**  
4 large parsnips  
1 1/2 cups tomato juice  
1/2 cup diced celery  
1/2 onion, sliced  
1 tsp. salt  
Dash of pepper  
2 whole cloves  
1 bay leaf

Wash, peel and dice the parsnips. Parboil parsnips in salt water for 15 minutes. Drain. Blend other ingredients and simmer for 10 minutes. Strain and add to parsnips for 10 minutes and serve hot. Makes 6 servings.

**Harvard Beets Green Beans**  
1 can of diced beets  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1 tsp. cornstarch  
1 tbsps. butter  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1 tsp. salt

Blend sugar, cornstarch, salt and vinegar. Boil together 5 minutes. Add beets and butter and reheat.

Cook fresh string beans 15 minutes, drain and turn out on a platter. Then pour Harvard beets around string beans.

**THE QUESTION BOX**  
**Peach Upside Down Cake**  
(Requested by Mrs. E. D.)  
2 cups canned peaches  
1 cup melted butter  
1 cup brown sugar  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 beaten egg  
1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
1 tsp. almond extract  
1 tsp. salt  
2 tps. baking powder  
1-3rd cup milk

Preheat electric oven to 350 degrees. Drain peaches. Arrange in greased eight-inch square cake pan. Combine butter and brown sugar, spread over peaches.

**To Make Batter:**  
Thoroughly cream shortening and granulated sugar. Add almond extract and beaten egg. Beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, mixing until smooth. Pour batter over peaches, spreading evenly to corners.

Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until cake is shrunken away from sides of pan and top is springy to the touch. Remove from oven. Let stand for one minute, then turn on plate. Serve warm, cut into squares, topped with a little whipped cream or with puffing cream.

**Banana Gingerbread**  
(Requested by Mrs. G. P.)  
1/2 cup butter  
1-3rd cup brown sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1/4 cup molasses  
1/2 cup corn syrup  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. ginger  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 tsp. cloves

Cream butter, Men-in sugar, add eggs. Beat well. Combine molasses, 2-21
