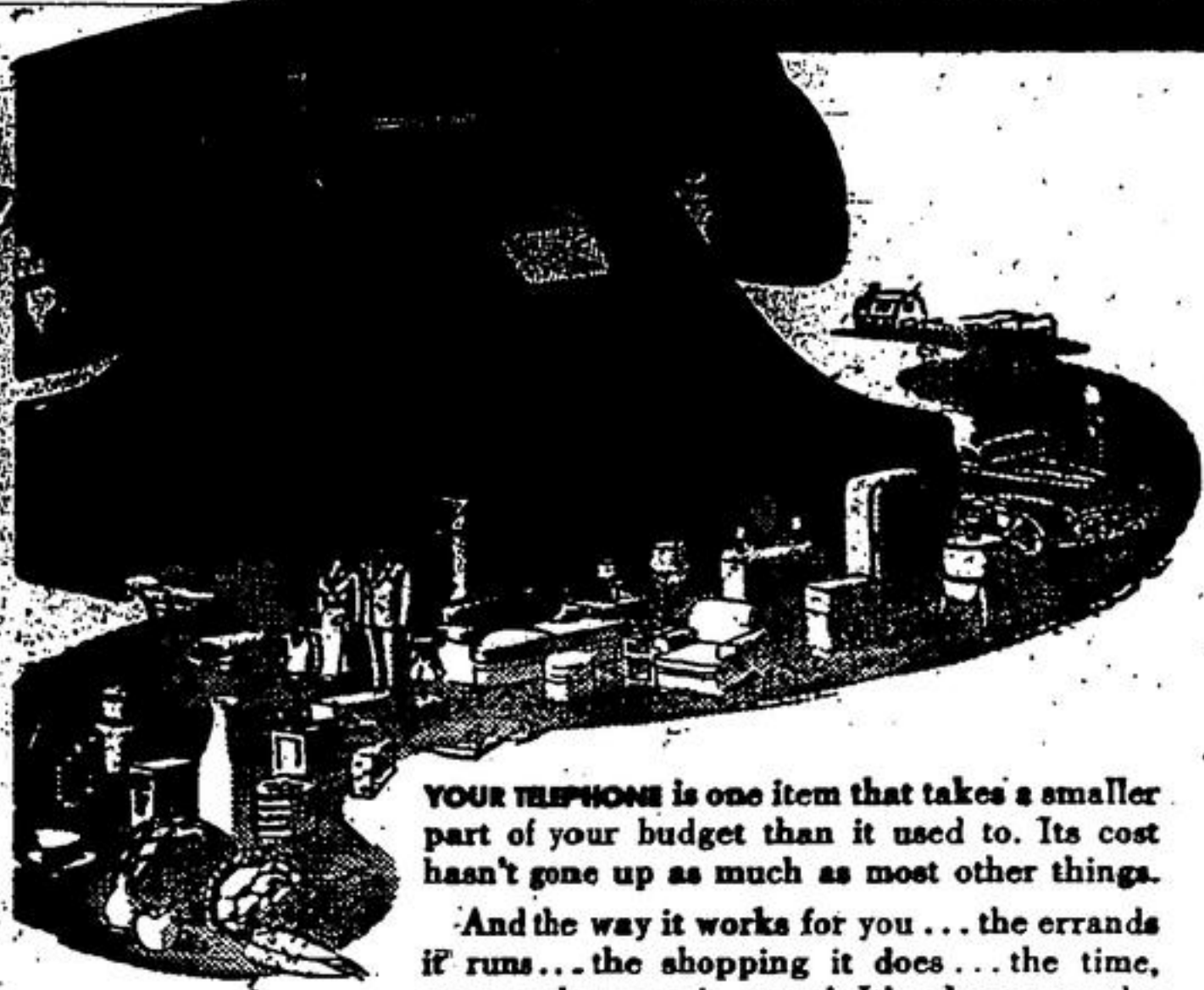

## UNITED CHURCH ASSISTS ESTABLISHMENT IMMIGRANTS

The Canadian immigration policy for the present year provides for the entry into Canada of 200,000 immigrants. Many of these will be displaced persons who have experienced the depths of human misery and who will enter into Canada as a land of hope — new life. The United Church of Canada through its Department of Immigration through its Board of Home Missions is endeavouring to bridge the gap between the immigrants and the citizens of our land.

Arrangements are being made by the Church to contact employers in the agricultural and specialized workers industries and businesses in order that negotiations might be set up to bring suitable employer and employee into an agreement.

In the realm of agriculture there will be many Dutch farmers and their families available for a period of one year or longer if mutually agreeable. In addition the United Church is endeavouring to bring a number of boys from 16 to 18 years of age, and single men over 18 years of age from Great Britain for farm work on a year-round basis.

In the non-farm businesses prospective employers presenting information as to type of workmen required and qualifications necessary will have their request considered by the Church's Director of Immigration who will endeavour to find a suitable employee.

It will be of interest to the residents of Georgetown and district to know that Mr. Alex Maclaren of Georgetown was about one year ago appointed Director of Immigration for the Board of Home Missions of the United Church of

Canada, and that this effort of bringing about suitable agreements between employers and prospective immigrant employees is under his supervision. - Richard L. Hegen Generating Station Formerly Toronto Generating Station. Capacity 336,000 H.P. Initial operation fall 1951, complete in early 1952.
- Otto Holden Generating Station Formerly La Cava Generating Station, Ottawa River. Capacity 250,000 H.P. Initial operation, early 1952.
- J. Clark Keith Generating Station Formerly Windsor Generating Station. Initial operation late 1951, full operation 1952.
- E. V. Buchanan Frequency Changer and Transformer Station Formerly Westminster Frequency Changer and Transformer Station.
- E. N. Marshall Frequency Changer and Transformer Station Formerly Sudbury Frequency Changer and Transformer Station.
- Sam L. Dobbin Transformer Station Formerly Peterborough Transformer Station.
- George W. Rayner Generating Station Formerly Tunnel Generating Station. Capacity 56,000 H.P. Started in 1947 in operation 1950.
- A. W. Manby Transformer Station Formerly Kipping Transformer Station, Toronto. In operation 1949.
