Parents Attend GPS Open Night Monday

It was very gratifying to the teachers to see the interest taken by parents in the education of their children, as shown by the excellent attendance at the school on Monday evening when Open House was held. More than 800 signed the guest books. Parents commented on the brightness and attractiveness of the classrooms, the good state of equipment and the fine standard of work evident in each room.

Some people were of the opinion that the response to the Red Cross Campaign had not been as generous from an eleven-roomed school. It was perhaps overlooked however, that various class groups have projects underway, purchasing and sending student kits and health kits to European children, and various amounts on hand to be sent out in the near future, all of which would enlarge the total of \$27.50 for the school considerably.

Principal Harold Henry attended the regular monthly meeting of principals of Halton which was held at Milton on Tuesday. A generalized discussion was held.

Teachers on the staff saw two films on Tuesday morning which were recommended by Inspector L. L. Skuce. They portrayed the importance of Physical Education and how it is carried on for large groups in limited space to an advantage. "Proper physical activity provides a stimulant for mental activity" it showed.
