

Georgetown Native Dies in Saskatchewan

Mrs. Isabelle McLean Brebner, wife of Albert E. Brebner, Tatsfield, Saskatchewan, was buried in Cut Knife, Sask. Cemetery following a funeral service in Cut Knife United Church.

Mrs. Brebner died in Notre Dame Hospital, North Battleford on February 16th after an illness of eight months' duration.

Mrs. Brebner was born on November 2nd, 1878, at Georgetown, daughter of the late William Bingham and Elizabeth McCullough. She was married to Albert Brebner on April 14th, 1909, at Powassan and they moved to Tatsfield in 1918.

Mrs. Brebner is survived by her husband, three sons, Kenneth of Tatsfield, William, Carruthers and Milton (Happy) of Vancouver and four grandchildren; also two brothers, S. F. Bingham, Tatsfield, and Latimer M. Bingham, Cut Knife and three sisters, Mrs. K. Woodward, Tatsfield, Mrs. J. R. Rodgers, Barrie and Mrs. M. McLoughlin, Toronto.

Rev. Ivan Carrol, Presbyterian minister of North Battleford conducted the funeral service. The favourite hymn of the deceased "Be-

yond the Sunset" was sung in duet by Mrs. Ted Boden and Mrs. S. Hamilton. Pallbearers were H. Bradford, W. Bradford and H. Caldwell of Carruthers, T. Hampson, E. B. Woodward and F. N. Bingham of Tatsfield.

FARM NEWS

New Canucks Lead Way In Soil Cultivation

In recent years failure to secure satisfactory catches of seeds has developed into a serious problem on many farms in Halton. In the main this has been largely due to lack of sufficient moisture during the critical growing period of May and June. It is our opinion that if our soils were higher in organic matter, our supply of soil moisture would not be depleted so rapidly in adverse periods. The problem is how to build up the organic matter content in our soils. In general our heavier soils are naturally low in organic matter and consequently very sensitive to either too much or too little moisture. The plowing down of clover crops is an old and proven practice. In recent years, however, due to our shortage of

hay and pasture, seldom do we see any worth while amount of top being turned under. In other words, when we plow under a sod it usually has been pared almost to the bare ground. Sod crops are soil builders but not under the practice referred to above. Such a practice can be almost as detrimental as cash cropping and in a sense it is cash cropping. The point is how are we to rectify this situation. It would seem that we might very well accept the practice followed by some of our "new Canadians." Many instances have been brought to our attention where these "foreigners" as we call them, having purchased a badly run-down farm, proceeded to put Canadians to shame. Their policy, as we understand it, is to cover crop ten per cent of their land each year. The field may be sown to a mixture of Sudan Grass, millet and sorghum around June 1st—in August the green crop is turned under and resown to a mixture of oats and rye, which in turn is top worked the following spring and sown to a crop for harvest. The idea seems to us to have a good deal of merit—in any event our foreign born farmers are getting results. We hope to see the idea tried out in Halton in 1951.



Appointment of Lt.-Col. Walter B. G. Reynolds, OBE, of Ottawa, as national director of the Canadian Red Cross Disaster Services was announced today by Major General Churchill Mann, national volunteer chairman. Colonel Reynolds retired from the Canadian Army last year, where as Director of Air at Army headquarters in Ottawa, he planned and coordinated joint operations involving elements of the army, air force and naval air section. For his work in planning joint army, air force operations at First Canadian Army Headquarters in Northwest Europe during the war, he was awarded the OBE in 1945.

Colonel Reynolds succeeds Dr. Harvey Doney, MBE, who is retiring to private practice after five years of service with Red Cross as national director of First Aid, Swimming and Water Safety and national director of Disaster Services.

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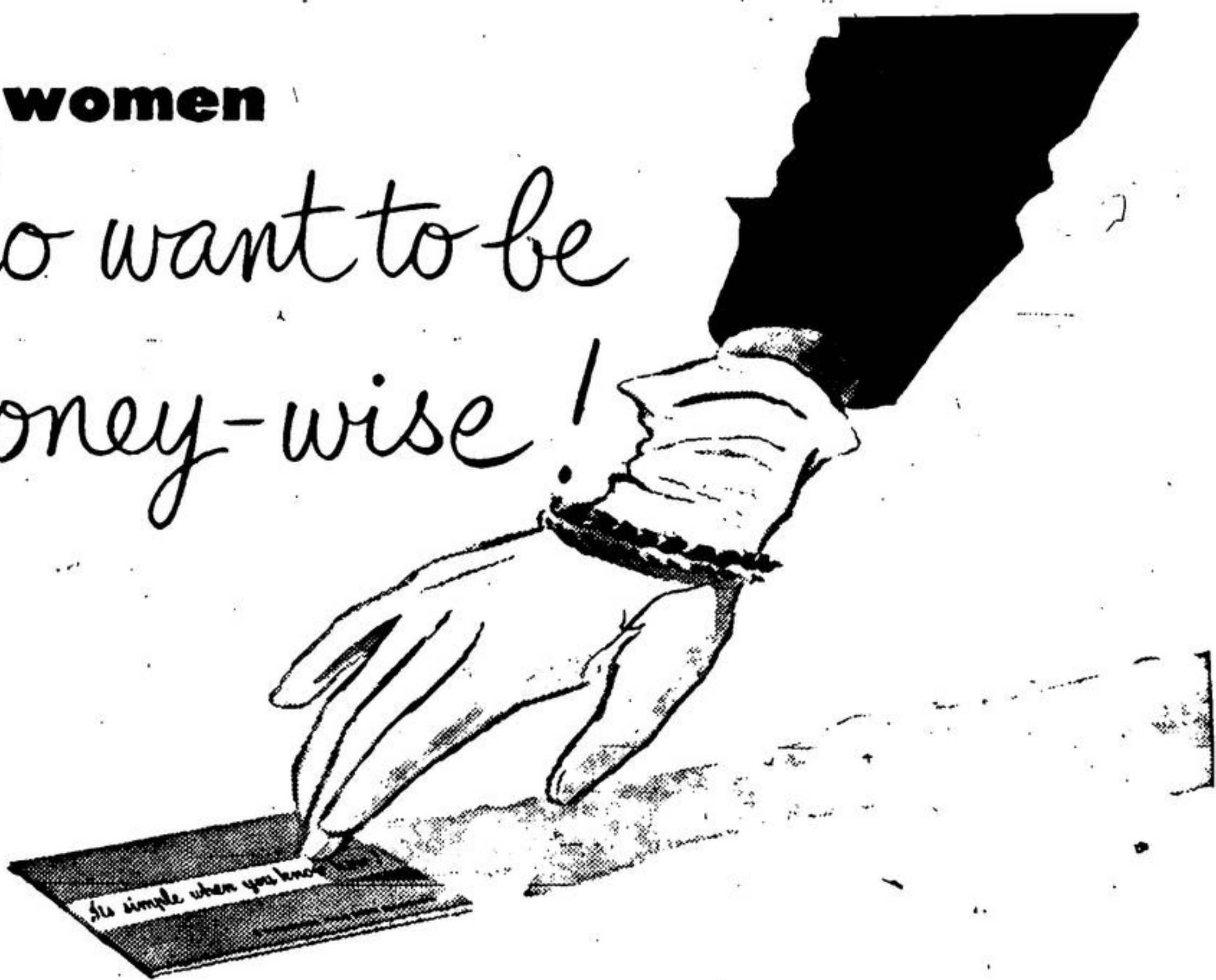
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
