and the late John M. Hillis. Miss Hillis, who was seventeen years of age, died in Woodstock on Tuesday. She was born in Norval. Pallbearers were six cousins, George Bailey, Jim Davey, William, Melville, Thomas and Elmer McMann. Interment was made in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.

Revered Resident Dies at Acton Home

An outstanding Christian life ended on February 23 when Mrs. Henry Caldwell died at her home in Acton.

Mrs. Caldwell was born Elizabeth Jane Kitching, daughter of John and Elizabeth Kitching in Nassagaweya Township, March 28, 1874. She attended Alma College, St. Thomas and in 1895 married Mr. Caldwell, a Methodist and later a United Church minister.

They served together in pastorates at Ker, Burford, Fonthill, Allenford, Hagersville, Waterford, Currie's, Georgetown, Limehouse and Merritt, retiring in Acton sixteen years ago. Mr. Caldwell died six months after they moved to Acton.

Mrs. Caldwell is survived by four daughters, Mrs. C. J. Buck, (Elizabeth), Georgetown, Mrs. R. G. Agnew (Mary), Toronto, Mrs. Earl Vannatter (Emily), Fenelon Falls and Mrs. Archie Korr (Lydia), Acton, nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. She is also survived by four brothers and one sister, Rev. J. W. Kitching, Hamilton, Rev. G. R. Kitching, Weston, Mrs. Ida Moffat, Kneehill Valley, Alberta, W. R. Kitching, Guelph and F. J. Kitching on the home farm in Nassagaweya. She was predeceased by a daughter Ida, two sisters and one brother.

Rev. E. A. Curry conducted a private funeral service at her home followed by a public service in Acton United Church when six other ministers took part. They were Rev. Milton Aiken, Peterborough, who started in the ministry during their pastorates at Allentown and was ordained by Mr. Caldwell when he was president of Hamilton Conference, Rev. J. W. Fiddes, Fort Erie; president of Hamilton Conference, Rev. F. Mercer, Freeman, Rev. C. R. Albright, Freeport, Rev. J. T. Heslop, Paris, and Rev. A. W. Fosbury, Hanover.

The pallbearers were nephews: Dr. John Kitching, Hamilton; Lloyd Convey and John Kitching, Guelph; William Caldwell, Toronto; Harry Caldwell, Durham; and Professor Harold Kitching of the OAC, Guelph. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton.
