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The Editor's Corner

SCHOOL COSTS AGAIN

Esquesing has again raised the contentious problem of the sharing of school costs by the five north Halton municipalities which are included in the high school district.

Last year, the township was successful in arriving at a better split after some complicated manoeuvres which included a board of arbitration and an agreement by Georgetown to accept a larger share of the cost.

This years the costs have been assessed, as have been other county costs, on a special one-year assessment established by county judge Robinson in December. The intervention of the judge was necessary when Burlington and Oakville appealed a temporary equalization which was passed by county council. This, we understand, has been accepted by all Halton municipalities through their county representatives.

It does not seem fair that after so much time has been spent by county council on the subject and a solution apparently arrived at that the school board should have to go over the ground all over again.

ARTISTS DON'T LIKE IT EITHER

It is encouraging to know that four Ontario artists feel sufficiently strongly opposed to the new form of expressionism in painting to resign their membership in the Ontario Society of Artists. The matter came to a head last week when the four artists, all well-known professionals, objected to some of the modernistic trash chosen for exhibit at the annual OSA show at the Toronto Art Gallery.

Perhaps this drastic action will help to dispel from a segment of the public mind the idea that if someone says it is art, it is. Some of the so-called modern school of painting wouldn't do credit to a 6-year-old and it flourishes only because there are people who think it is smart to admire something they can't understand.

It is those same people who profess admiration for obscure poetry, drama or music - the more obscure the better it must be. They account for the success of plays such as "The Cocktail Party" and "The Lady's Not for Burning" which even the critics don't seem to understand, while straight dramas like Canada's "Ti-Coq" flop on Broadway. They sniff at the poetry of Edgar Guest, cannot accept Gershwin or Ellington and shudder when one suggests that "Oklahoma" is a worthy rival to any European opera.

Opening Dates Announced Trout, pickerel and pike anglers, will get a real break this year with earlier opening dates it was learned today when the open seasons on game fish for the Province of Ontario for 1951 were officially announced by Harold R. Scott, Minister, Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

The opening date for speckled, brown, rainbow, Aurora and Kamloops trout has been advanced to April 28th from May 1 and that of yellow pickerel and great northern pike to May 12 instead of May 15.

The reason for the earlier opening dates, it was explained, was to give anglers the benefit of a week-end's fishing on the opening dates. The old dates of May 1 and May 15, both fell on a Tuesday The new dates come on Saturdays

In allecases the length of a fish is measured from the tip of the snout to the centre of the posterior edge of the tail.

The open seasons, bag and size of limits on the various species, with all dates inclusive, are as follows:

Black Bass: July 1st to October 15th, except (1) St Clair River, Lake St. Clair and Detroit River; June 25th to December 15th, and (ii) Lake Eric and Magara River between Lake Eric and Niagara Falls; July 1st to December 15th.

Maskinonge: (a) North and west of and including the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing: June 20th to October 1st; (b) South of and excluding the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing: July 1st to October 1st, except --(i) St. Clair River, Lake St. Clair and Detroit River; June 25 to December 15; and (ii) Lake Eric and Niagara River between Lake Erie and Niagara Falls; July 1st to December 15th.

Speckled Trout, Brown Trout, Aurora Trout. Kamloops Trout -

April 28th to September 15th. Lake Trout: (a) No closed season in Great Lakes, Georgian Bay, North Channel, the interent international connecting waters and the St. Lawrence River; (b) North and west of and including the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing (other than 'a'.)
