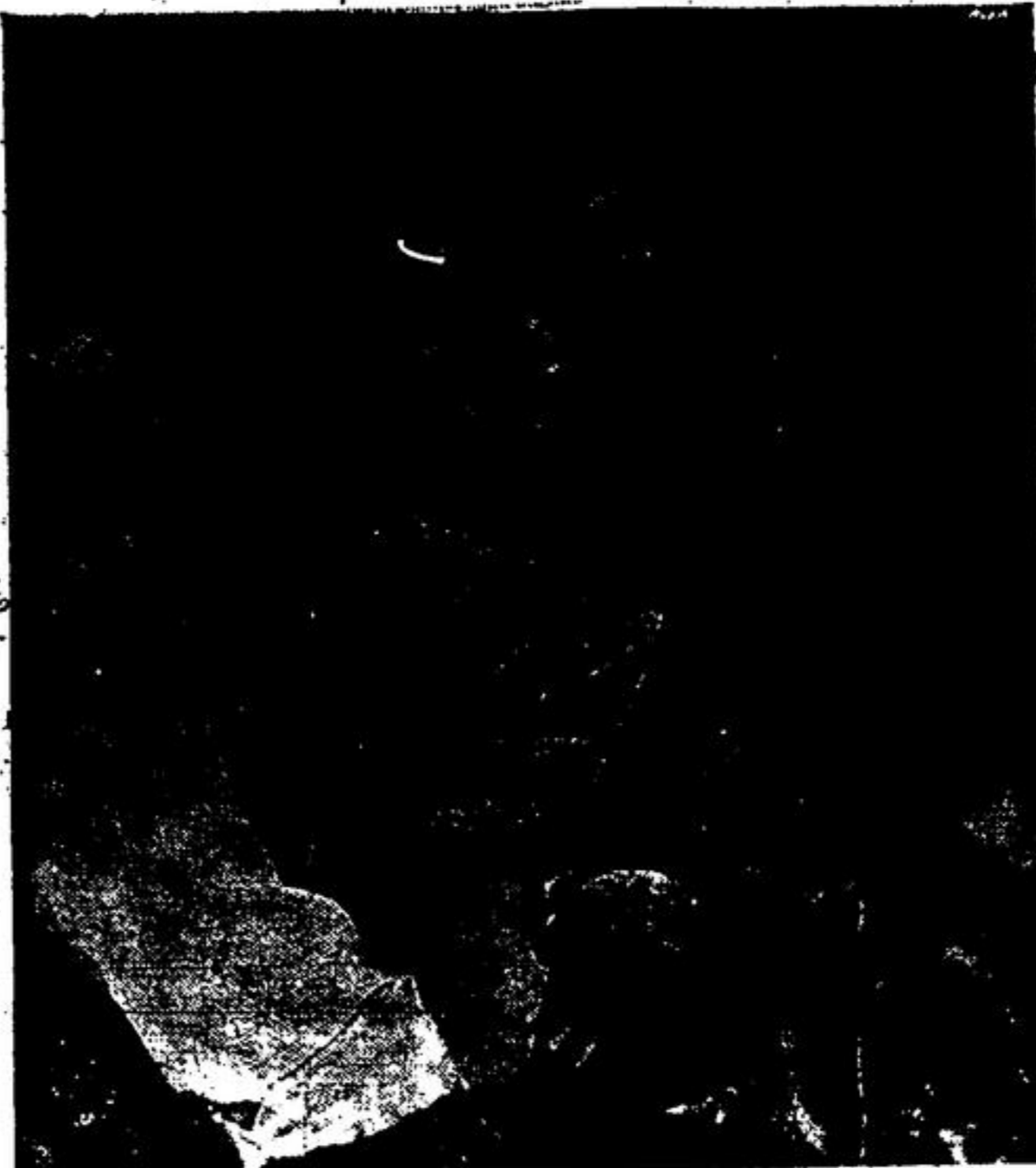

School Costs too High Demand Arbitration

Esqueing Township has appealed their levy for high school education. At the last meeting of North Halton High School District board, the board, at the township's request, asked for a board of arbitration to deal with the matter.

Esqueing's share of the \$40,900 required for high school education from the taxpayers this year is \$15,828, 38.7 per cent of the total. This figure was derived from an agreement made by all municipalities for an equalization of county costs in 1951, pending the adoption of the new assessing system by all. A board member, G. A. Dills of Acton, pointed out at the meeting that in a similar dispute in Elmira, which was eventually carried to the Municipal Board, the ruling had been that the equalized assessment was the only basis on which school costs could be levied. Last year, Esqueing had their share reduced when Georgetown assumed a higher share of costs than the town needed to pay.

When the board was informed that the Federation of Teachers has set \$2500 as minimum salary for any member to accept, the present minimum of \$2300 was raised to that figure, effective next September. This will mean some upward adjustments in the salaries of three or four of the present teachers. Two new teachers are needed in Acton next fall and the management committee, with Principal Robbins will interview several applicants next week in Toronto.

The board discussed the possible purchase of an additional half acre of land adjoining Milton High School for use by classes in agriculture.

Burlington-Nelson school board, which had objected to paying fees for students from their district attending Milton school were reminded that their permission is not necessary if the students have better transportation or can take courses not offered in other schools.

A letter received from J. E. White-lock told of the success of the night school at Milton and thanked the board for the use of the school. Enrollment had been 332 and several applications had to be turned down. There are already people enrolling for next year's course, Mr. White-lock said.
