Suilect Eggs Frequently, Poultryman Urges. Farmers

Quality of eggs depends greatly on how quickly they are cooled a after they are laid, reports J. M. Moore, extension poultryman at Michigar state college.

.. He points out that consumer interest in ages centers on quality USDA p ultry specialists estimate that 5 eggs out of each 100 produced become unfit for food as a result of quality deterioration or other causes. This 5 per cent loss has taken an armual toll of more. than 233 million dozen eggs in the. past five years.

Farmers are urged to collect eggs from nestsr at least three times each day-1" a. in., noon, and 5 p. mi. Less frequent collec-Afon not only delays proper coolingof the eggs but also, results in a partly cooled egg being left in a nest to be re-warmed by other ensousing the same nest. In very not weather, eggs silould be gath; ered every two hours in the more ing and twice in the afternoon

Eggs should be collected in wire backets which permit the free orculation of air around every egg This is impossible when par's, boxes, or woven baskets are used They should be placed on a wire tray and put in the cellar immediately after collecting. Because eggs absorb idors quickly they should not be kept in places where there are strong odors such as those of onions, lemons, kerosene, or mustuness.

Figgs should be fully cooled tofore they are placed in egg cases since there is not sufficient air cir culation in cases to allow eggs to cool properly. Moor- concludes

Tobacco Is Exacting Feeder

Experiments with tertilizer for tobacco show that this crop is one of the most exacting of all plants For most crops, says the " S department of igniculture, the type of machine that places the ound of fertilizer at one side of the roy gives results just" as satisfactory as from a band on each side. But with tobacco of most types, says J E. McMurtrey Jr , of the burns . of plant industry, soils, and agr cultural engineerings recent research work shows that a one-side application "frequently produces one-sided growth effects" Some chlorine produces destrable responses with certain tobacco types, but it is extremely easy to supply too much, which will reduce the fire holding quality of the leaf grades used for cigar, cigarette and smoking tobacco. As little as twenty pounds to the acre may be enough on some soils where due cured tobacco is grown but should be held to a minimum with e:gar, burley and Maryland types.

Caves Saved Thousands

Two of the world's most heavily bombed spots, the English channel port of Dover and the British Mediterranean isle of Malta, made life-savers of old catacombs. Manchildren sheltered beneath the FURNITURE - McClary 4-plate white cliffs of Dover remembere! no other home. In Malta's network of under - rock corridors, dating from crusaders' times, the islanders found protection for their lives. their planes, and meager supplies of food, notes the National Geographic society.
