Opposes Retail Turnover Tax

Dear Sir:

Limehouse, Ont.

Following is a copy of a letter sent last week to Prime Minister St. Laurent and the three other party leaders in the House, concerning the proposed 3% turnover tax.

Dear Mr. St. Laurent:

We understand that your government will submit a constitutional amendment to the present session of parliament to empower the provinces to collect a 3 per cent turnover tax on retail trade.

May we point out that a substantial proportion of industrial workers have had the 'escalator clause' written into their wage agreements. As the tax you propose will add to the cost of living and enter into the cost of living index, these workers benefitting from the escalator clause would therefore automatically obtain wage increases to offset the proposed tax, and in full effect would be exempt from its payment.

Other citizens would then have to pay a surtax on the 3 per cent tax through the increased price of goods caused by such a wage increase. To put the matter plainly, it is indisputable that some will not have to pay the tax, and it is equally positive that others will have to pay it for them, in addition to the payment of their own.

While the labor laws which permit wages to be tied to the cost of living are the legislative concern of the provincial governments, your government must undoubtedly share the responsibility of entering into an agreement which, in the manner we have outlined, would favour one class and be most viciously discriminatory against others.

We therefore respectfully ask assurance that your government will not enter into any such agreement as proposed with provinces which permit wages to be governed by a cost of living index in any manner whatever.

Can't Restrict Art Is Reader's Opinion

Dear Sir:

Your editorial comment, captioned "Artists don't like it either", which appeared in your last week's issue, quite intrigued me. It could set cultural Georgetown a-luzzing.

Having myself, no least competence in any of the Arts, I am particularly well qualified to take sides on the argument. Indeed, I feel I could quite easily embrace, both sides.

With opinions, others, I have been brought up to regard Art as universal. If that be true, it can't seem to be limited by the considerations your article suggests. When an individual expresses himself, or herself, by the medium of paintings, oil and brush, what is said meets with variable interpretation. You will take one meaning, I another, a third will take still another. Paintings, like poetry, can be made to say those things which may not be said in conversation. As Clevero said: "A letter does not blush."


It is true that some of what is said with a paint brush would be objectionable if said orally, and such restraint as is imposed on moral grounds may be wise and proper; but to restrict art to only those areas of expression where it might be thought snobbish would not tilt its nose, would, in my judgment, be unworthy of our age and place in world history.
