**Mobile X-Ray Clinic  
Visits High School**

Through the co-operation of the  
Ontario Department of Health the  
Haltom County Health and Tubercu-  
losis Association and the Haltom  
County Health Unit, free chest  
x-rays are being offered to all high  
school students in Haltom county.  
This has been made possible by the  
purchase of Christmas seals by the  
people of Haltom County.

A mobile clinic from the Provin-  
cial Department of Health will visit  
the high schools in Acton, Burling-  
ton, Georgetown and Milton. In  
Oakville, the students will have their  
x-rays done in the Oakville-Trafal-  
gar Memorial Hospital where, thro  
a federal health grant, special X-ray  
equipment was installed when the  
hospital was built. This special
