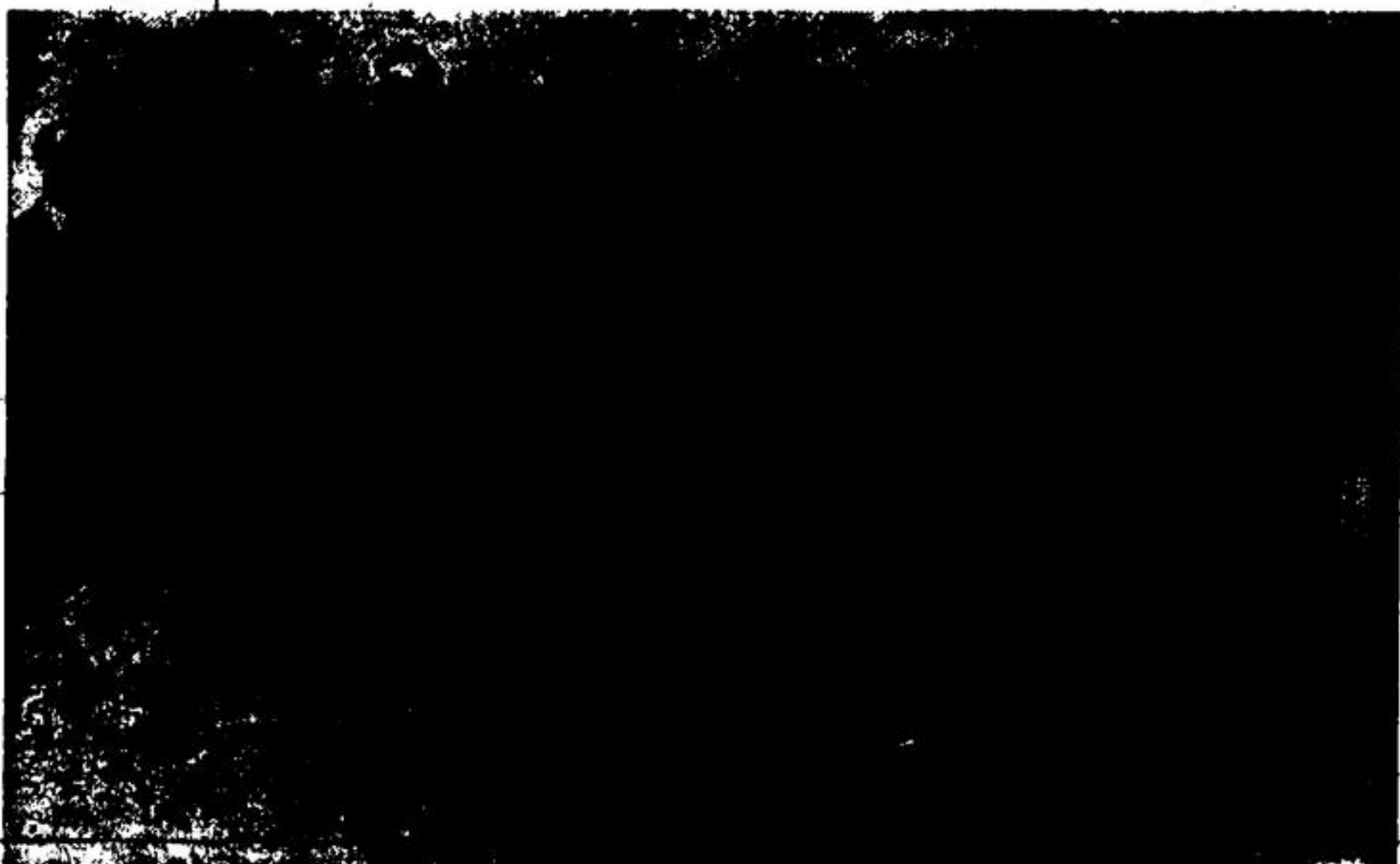
Drumsticks for All If This Keeps Up

One four-legged chick is a phenomena but when you see two in one week, you can hardly believe your eyes. That has been the experience of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Thompson, who run one of Ontario's largest hatcheries on Rural Route 3, Georgetown.

Last week a downy little Light Sussex came into the world with two extra legs. The two legs grew from what seemed to be an extra thigh and were twined together, though both feet were perfectly formed. The chick was smaller than his mates in the same hatch. Four or five days later he died.

Last Friday came the second chick; this time a real four-footed specimen. The back legs are somewhat short and did not touch the ground. They are well-formed except that one foot has only two toes. This chick seems healthy and is of good size and the Thompsons are hoping that he will live to maturity.
