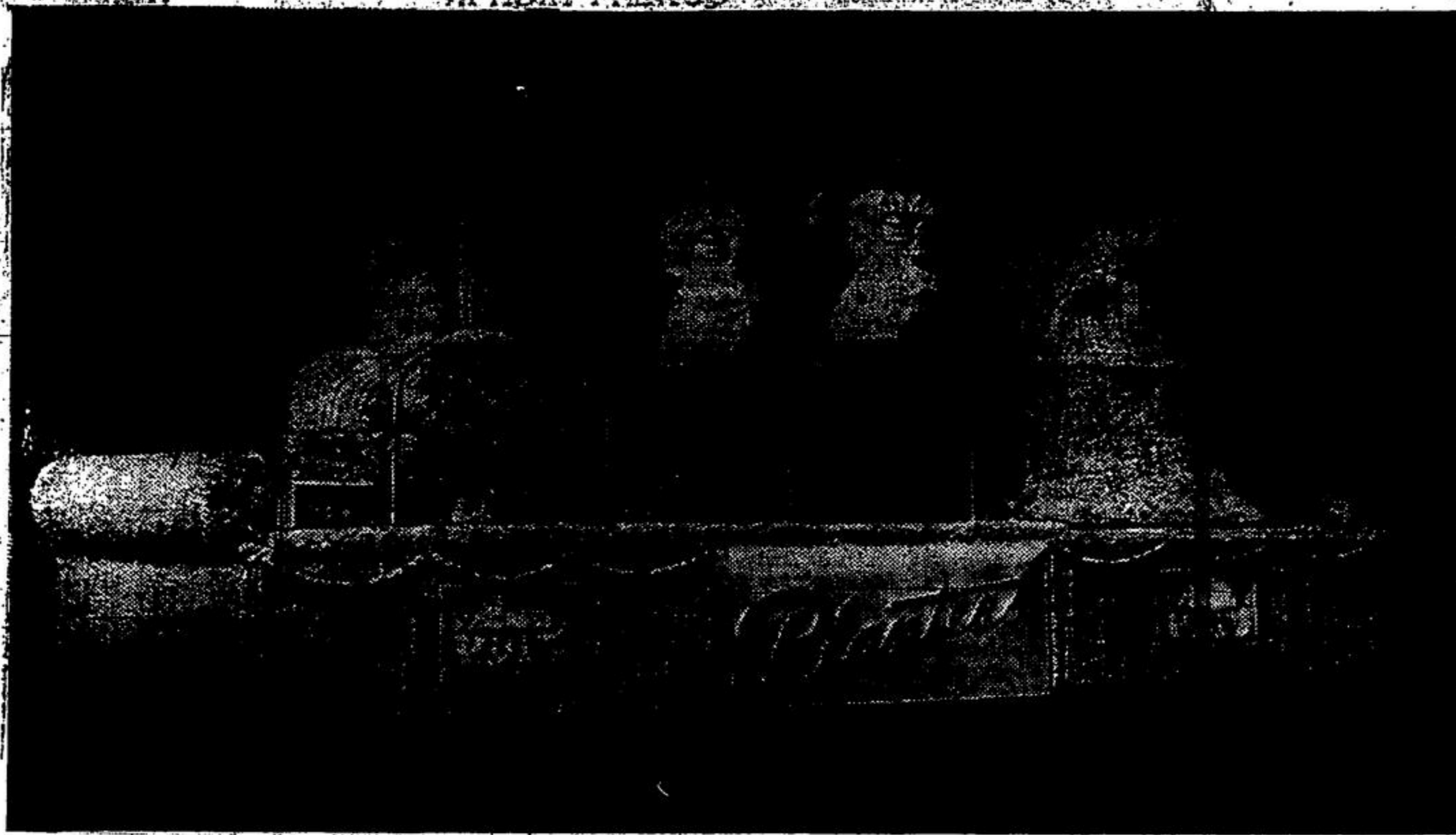
### Change in Limestone Subvention Policy

In future, farmers wishing to secure Agricultural Limestone in truck load quantities can do so with a minimum of trouble. Recently the regulations governing the Agricultural Limestone Subvention Policy were revised. Under the new regulations it is no longer necessary to secure a permit before ordering limestone to be transported by truck. Farmers will simply order the lime and after it has been delivered they pay for the lime plus the total trucking charges. Then they apply to the local office of the Ontario Department of Agriculture for an "Application for Subsidy" form. This must be signed by both the farmer and the Agricultural Representative. The actual amount of the subsidy remains unchanged, amounting to three cents per ton per mile up to a maximum of one dollar per ton. In the case of carlot shipments, however, the regulations remain unchanged. In short, the first step is to secure a permit from the local Agricultural Office.

For the twelve month period ending March 31st, 1951, the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture paid a subsidy on 3,047 tons of Agricultural Lime distributed in Halton, representing an increase of 50 per cent over the previous twelve month period.

### Holstein Breaks World Record

MOTHER & DAUGHTER HOLSTEIN CHAMPIONS

A purebred Holstein heifer, bred and owned by Norman W. McConkey, Peterboro, has just been announced as a World Champion producer. Her dam is also a Champion and the pair make a very rare combination of mother and daughter, both champions.

The McConkey heifer is Laffoe Macaber Re-Echo. She is the new World Champion for milk in the senior four year old class of the 305 day division on three times a day milking with 27,978 lbs. milk containing 995 lbs. fat, average test 3.56 percent butterfat. Continued on test for the full year she produced 31,038 lbs. milk and 1132 lbs. fat, average test 3.64 percent butterfat which record is the second largest for both milk and fat yet completed in its class in Canada.

The dam of the McConkey heifer is Re-Echo May Burke, owned by J. E. Houck, Brampton, who last December completed a 365 day record as an eleven year old of 35,314 lbs. milk and 1261 lbs. fat. This is a Canadian record for milk regardless of age or times milked daily, is a North American record over all ages on three times a day milking and is a World Record for a cow past ten years old on three times a day milking.

Both mother and daughter are "good lookers" as well as champion producers, the dam having been officially classified as "Excellent" the highest attainable rating for conformation and the daughter having been classified as "Very Good" the second highest rating.

The former world champion for milk in the senior four year old class of the 305 day division on three times a day milking was Canary Korndyke Alcartra who made her record in 1928 in the herd of B. H. Thomson, Moose Jaw, Sask. Her record of 28,398 lbs. milk containing 1080 lbs. fat, average test 4.09 percent butterfat is still a world record for fat in the class. The McConkey heifer stands second to her for fat in Canada in the class.

The new champion's latest calf, a bull, has been purchased for artificial use by the Maple Cattle Breeders' Association Maple, at a reported \$6,000.
