Meeting as a board of arbitration Monday, assessors of the five North Halton municipalities brought in their verdict on a new share of high school costs sought by Esquesing Township.

With the Georgetown assessor the omy dissenter, present costs which were based on the equalized assessment were changed to a new basis, that of the new equalization assessment which is expected to come into force in 1952. All municipaltties have completed their new assesexcept Esquesing which claims their estimate of \$4,728,401 will closely parallel the final Tig-

The only radical change in the arbitration board's decision is for Georgetown to pay approximately \$2400 more in school taxes and Esquesing \$2200 less. These two municipalities are at present billed for \$7489 and \$15,828 respectively. The board's decision changes these figures to \$9730 and \$13,612.

Agreed Last Year

When the same situation arose last ear, a board of arbitration suggested that Georgetown, pay \$8313.40 but Georgetown council demurred claiming that their budget figure was \$7,000. Georgetown and Esquesing finally agreed to split the excess over \$7,000 and the town received a cheque for \$656.70 from the township during the year.

This year, the arbitration board, at its first meeting, recommended a sharing of costs on the same basis. as last year, Georgetown assessment commissioner Joseph Gibbons being the lone dissenter. Georgetown council turned down this recommendation and the matter went back to the board of arbitrators again.

The decision of the board of arbitrators, which is composed of the assessors of the five municipalities with county assessor Ford Rogers as chairman, will be imparted to the five municipalities concerned and is binding, unless any one municipality objects. If this occurs, that municipality appeals to North Halton High School Board within thirty days, and the board in turn notifies the Municipal Board The Municipal Board's decision is binding for five years when the assessment of the numeripalities concerned increases by ten per cent for two consecutive years or unless there is a change in
