TRIPLITT OPERATIONS SLACK BLAME USA PRIORITY LACK

Lack of American priority ratings for certain essential materials has caused curtailment of operations in a Georgetown industry, Triplett Instruments of Canada.

The news was made public this week by Edwin Wilson, head of the firm, which is a subsidiary of an American company, Triplett Electrical Instrument Co., Bluffton, Ohio. The company has been located in Georgetown for the past five years. Last June, its present building on John Street was purchased from B. F. Murfin and the plant was moved from its first location in the Cordaro Building on Main Street.

The company has a good quantity of orders on hand, but finds it impossible to procure certain magnet materials and special parts essential to the manufacture of its products. It is one of three firms in Canada which manufacture radio test equipment, including tube testers, signal generators, multimeters and panel instruments.

The company, which employed 24 during its peak production, will carry on as long as possible, converting present stock into finished articles, with the hope that the supply picture will clear in the coming months. There are ten employees at present, working under Mr. Alfred G. Andrews.

Mr. Wilson has joined engineering department at Smith & Stone, Ltd. and R. J. (Bob) Smith left last week to take a new position in Toronto with a real estate firm, Margaret Sargent, who was office clerk is working in Smith & Stone office.
