Pelletterio Heading For High Junior Post

The annual Junior Farmer Conference which was held at the Ontario Agricultural College the early part of last week is always a highlight for rural young people. We understand that Memoral Hall at the College could not accommodate the huge gathering of eleven hundred for their Church Service. Halton delegates all report a splendld programme. One of the annual highlights is always the election of their executive officers. During the life of the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario a number of top flight young people have served as president. Jack Cockburn, of Drumbo, who turned over the reins of office last week to Miss Eleanor Saracuse, the new president from Nariolk County, is an outstanding example. It will be of particular interest to all of our readers to learn that David Pelletterio, President of Halton Junior Farmers, was elected as the first vice president of the Provincial organization. In short, under normal circumstances Dave should be the provincial President in 1952. It is no small honour to be elected to the executive committee of any provincial organization, and certainly the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario is recognized today as one "of the leading rural organizations of this province. It will be recalled that Dave was one of the four Junior Farmers who represented Ontario in Great Britain in 1950. While perhaps the youngest in years of anyone yet selected for this high office, he has had a noteworthy career in Junior Farmer activities. For several years he was a top contestant in Calf Club work in this County. In 1947 he and Henk DeVries of Georgetown, represented the Milton Holstein Calf Club in the Prov incial Inter-Club competitions, and won the Provincial Championship, and later represented this Province in the Dominion or Inter-Provincial contest at the Royal Winter Fair the same year.

Dave was also a member of the 1949 team representing Halton in the inter-county Live Stock Judging Competition at the Royal, where he was awarded the Gold Medal for the high contestant in judging dairy cattle. He is the immediate past president of Palermo Junior Farmers, and at the present time is one of the three supervisors engaged in Dairy Herd Improvement Work in Halton County, His election as Vice president of the Junior Farmers Association of Ontario is indeed a well deserved tribute and reflects considerable nonour to his home County, and in particular to the Junior Farmers of Halton, who are recognized as one of the most active groups in the province.

FARM NEWS

Pasturing Reduces New Seeding Vigor

Experimental stations have always advised against any intensive pasturing of new seedings the first fall or as a matter of fact against pasturing any meadow too closely, particularly during the month of September, when the grasses and clovers are storing up food supplies for the winter. Almost every practical farmer will agree that this is sound advice, but in recent years in Halton, due to poor seed catches and lack of adequate moisture at the critical growing period, a great

nany farmers have found it necessary to pasture anything that was available. During the past week we had the effect of pasturing new seedings in the fall brought to our attention by one of our prominent Halton farmers. Like many others, he was short of pasture last fall and consequently his dairy herd from September on had the run of several stubble fields which had been seeded. In order to protect his bush lot he put up a temporay woven wire fence across the field adjoining the bush. In other words, the cattle had the run of part of the field only. There is still a good stand in both sections of the field but there is an almost unbelievable difference in the vigor and growth of the two sections. The grass and clover seeds had been sown through the grain box. with the grain and consequently the new seeds are, in rows. In the section of the field which was pastured the young seedlings are still there, but there had been little or no growth when we were there fast week. On the other hand right through the temporary fence where there has been no pasturing the grasses and clovers were almost filling in between the drills. It is going to be interesting to watch these two sections of the same field during the next six weeks to see if this difference persists right up to
