THE MIXING BOWL



HELLO HOME MAKERS! We know you will clip this column as soon as you find the scissors. The recipes are cookies that require no cooking. Perhaps this is the time to start a new section in your file and label. Unbaked Cookies. Clip these recipes and write or paste them on 3 by 3 inch cards.

Just one reminder in regard to these mixtures: Chill them in the refrigerator to maintain the flavour of each ingredient.

Date Rolls

1 lb. dates
1/2 cup figs
1/2 cup raisins
1 cup coconut

Spread 1 cup coconut in pan and brown delicately. Chop dates, figs and raisins, mix and form rolls. Roll in browned coconut.

Whole Wheat Puffs

Whole Wheat wafers
Marshmallow topping
Maraschino cherries
Brazil nuts

Drop a small spoonful of marshmallow topping on whole wheat or digestive biscuits. Sprinkle with slivered Brazil nuts and top with a half maraschino cherry on each.

Creamed Fruits

24 marshmallows, cut
1/4 lb. maraschino cherries
1 cup chopped walnuts
2 cups chopped dates
1 tin evaporated milk
1 flat box graham wafers
1/2 cup marshmallows. Drain cherries and cut. Mix marshmallows, cherries, walnuts, dates. Stir in graham wafer crumbs and milk alternately into fruit. Form mix into balls and roll in a few wafer crumbs. Chill.

Peanut Butter Pats

1 cup peanut butter
1 cup icing sugar
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
1/2 cup dates, chopped

Mix all ingredients thoroughly. Pat into small cakes and sprinkle with fine granulated sugar. Chill in electric refrigerator.

Sandies

1/2 cup whipping cream
1 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup chopped dates
12 marshmallows, cut small
12 graham wafers, rolled

Whip cream, until stiff. Add marshmallows and let stand in electric refrigerator 1 hour. Then add dates, nuts and 4 tbsps. wafer crumbs. Drop a teaspoonful of mixture at a time in remaining crumbs and form balls. Store in refrigerator until needed.

Lemon Cream Squares

Graham wafers
1 tin sweetened condensed milk
Juice of 2 lemons
Rind of 1 lemon

Line bottom of pan (approx. 7" x 11") with graham wafers placed side by side. Cover with filling. Beat milk, add lemon juice and rind; continue beating until thick. Spread evenly on each wafer. Top with another graham wafer. Place in refrigerator over night. (May cut squares in halves.)

Butterscotch Bars

4 butterscotch bars
2 tbsps. cream
3 cups rice krispies

Melt the packaged butterscotch and cream in double boiler, then add rice krispies. Drop on wax paper. Chill in electric refrigerator.

Mountain Tops

2 eggs
1 cup icing sugar
4 squares chocolate
20 marshmallows, cut
1 cup walnuts, cut

Beat eggs well and add icing sugar. Let stand until dissolved. Melt 4 squares chocolate over hot water, pour it hot over egg mixture. Add marshmallows and walnuts; mix well and drop by teaspoonfuls on wax paper. Chill 24 hours before using.

Honey Fruits

1 small bottle green cherries
1 small bottle red cherries
20 marshmallows
1 cup chopped walnuts
1 tbsp. honey

Drain cherries and chop them. Clip marshmallows into small pieces and chop nuts fine. Mix in honey thoroughly and let stand 10 minutes. Roll a teaspoonful at a time in icing sugar. Place balls on waxed paper and leave in electric refrigerator for two days.

TAKE A TIP

1. Cheese may cause an unpleasant flavour when stored beside eggs in the refrigerator. Wrap cheese in a cloth which has been dampened with vinegar and store in a covered casserole in the refrigerator. Eggs do not require any covering when the strong flavored foods are covered.

BALLINAFAD NONEGERIAN DIES BALLINAFAD NATIVE

A native of Ballinafad, where she was born 92 years ago, Miss Janet Binnie died at her home in Erin last week. She was a daughter of the late Thomas Binnie and Janet McCulloch.

When she was a young girl, the family moved to a farm at lot 14, 7th line, Erin, sixty five years ago, Miss Binnie moved to Erin where she engaged in dressmaking, carrying on her business until a few years ago.

Surviving are two brothers and a sister, Thomas and Robert, Erin Township, and Mrs. Jean Cunningham who lived with her sister and nursed her during her declining years.

Mr. A. H. Vair conducted the funeral service in Burns Presbyterian Church and interment was made in the family plot in Erin Cemetery. Six nephews were pallbearers — George, Alexander, Walter and George Binnie, Frank and Mac Cunningham.

It is usually a sign of becoming old and is not necessarily spoiled but it does lack flavour and attractiveness and should be trimmed off. Keep heads of lettuce placed cut-side down in a crisping pan of refrigerator.

3. Do not store prepared celery stalks, carrot sticks and radish roses in water. After rinsing them in cold water place them in a covered dish and keep cold.

4. Do not sprinkle wilted celery or carrots with salt to revive them. They usually become crisp under cold running water, or in lots of water to which ice cubes are added.

5. To extend butter for sandwiches, mix with a small amount of plain salad dressing—not too much to destroy the true flavour of butter.

6. A little mustard in peanut butter sandwiches brings out the nutty flavour.

7. Wrap sliced dry bread in a clean, damp cloth; then wrap in aluminum foil and heat in a warm oven for 10 minutes — it becomes delightfully fresh and soft.

Fifteen Holstein Bulls For Argentine Herds

A group of 15 Holstein bulls left Malton by air for Buenos Aires. These bovine blue bloods carry in their veins the richest bloodlines developed in many of Canada's top Holstein herds.

Argentina has long been noted for the raising of beef cattle but it's only in recent years that interest has developed in dairy cattle. The present importation is intended to raise the standards of Argentine Holsteins by introducing the blood of these outstanding sires.

The bulls were selected for their new Argentinian owners by a committee of three Argentine cattle experts, Guillermo Bullrich, Jose Lucto de Ocampo and Raul Mascarenhas all of Buenos Aires. These men visited the Royal Winter Fair last fall and made their selections afterwards. Five generation family trees were prepared and a thorough investigation of the ancestors of each bull was then made by Argentine Agricultural officials. Official permission for the importation was not granted until now.

Two bulls each were supplied by J. W. Greenwood, Maple, Ont. and Wm. Bousquet, La Presentation, Que and one each by: George R. McCaughey, Oshawa, Ont., J. J. E. McCaughey, Alliston, Ont., Raymondale Farm, Vaudreuil, Que., Hector I. Astengo, Brampton, Ont., Graymar Farm, Oakville, Ont., Sheffield Farms, St. George, Ont., D. H. McCaughey & Sons, Streetsville, Ont., Stewart Nelson, Keene, Ont., Clark E. Brown, Woodstock, Ont., Norloch Farm, Beachville, Ont., J. A. McDowell, Oxford, Centre, Ont. Also included were two bulls from Pabst Farms, Oconomowoc, Wis.

Indicative of the quality of the bulls is the fact that five of them are from dams classified "excellent the highest attainable rating for type and five are from "very good" dams the second highest rating. One bull is from a 1055 lb. World Champion producer, eight of the dams have yearly records above 800 lbs. fat, and in every case the dam or her dam exceeds 700 lbs. fat.

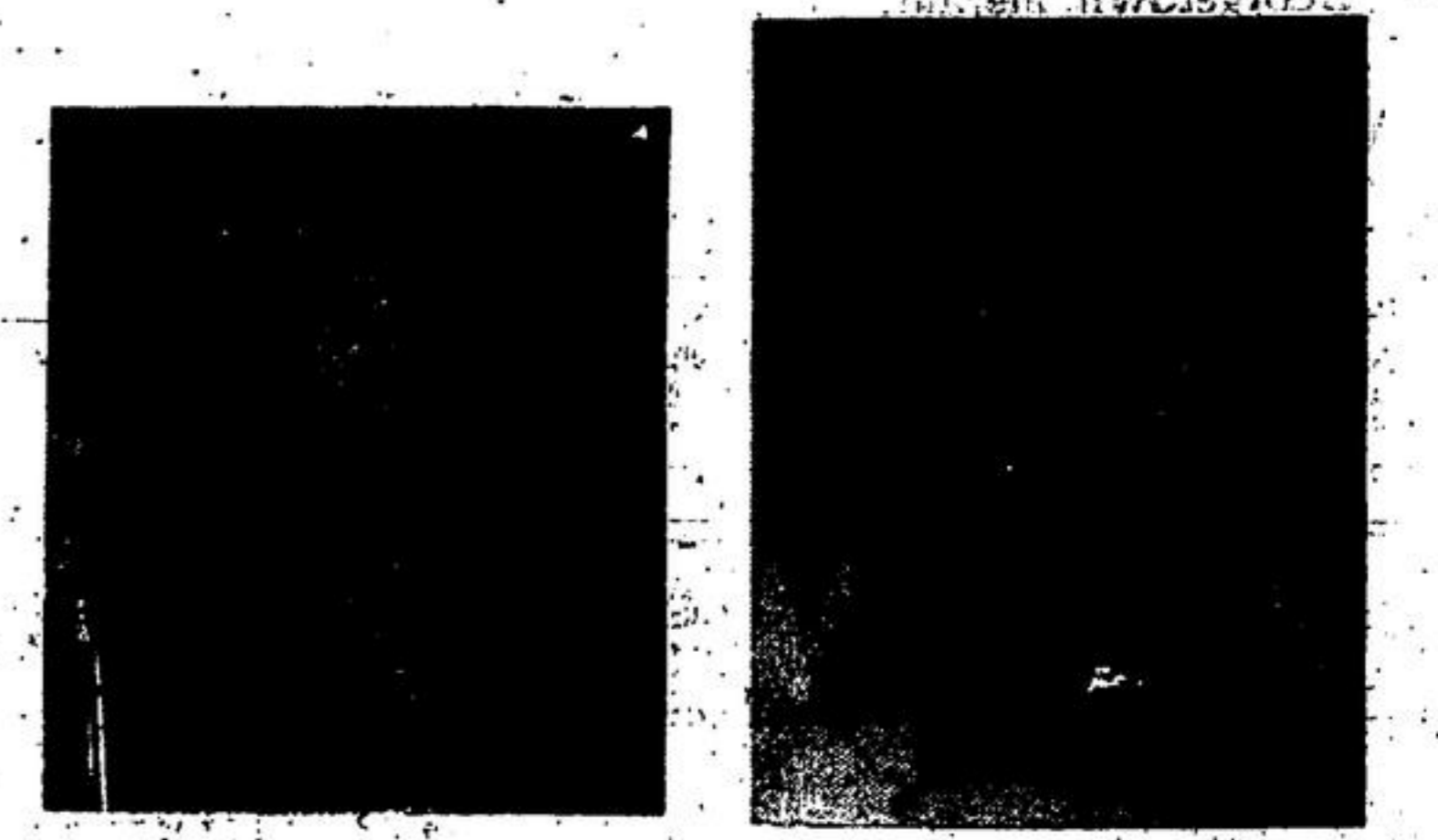
