At Esqueuing Council

ON MONDAY, MAY 7th

Council was notified by the Dept. of Highways that approval has been given for an expenditure of \$82,000 on roads in 1951.

Council filed a petition from the portion of School Area No. 1, formerly known as School Section No. 3 and no action was taken. Reeve George Currie voted against the motion; Deputy Reeve George Leslie and Councillors Wilfrid Bird, H. Craig Reid and Walter Linham supported it.

Wages of township road employees were increased 5c an hour, and the fee of the auditor, H. A. Lever was increased.

A copy of a resolution of the Arbitrators in connection with the appeal of the Township of Esqueuing against the 1951 levy for High School purposes in the North Halton High School District had been received from Lt. Col. G. O. Brown, secretary Treasurer of the Board.

Moved by A. Benton, seconded by K. C. Lindsay, that in view of the fact that the various municipalities in the county of Halton have spent a great deal of effort, time and money completing the new assessment under the County System, and further that a similar appeal last year was settled by arrangement of the understanding that the new assessment figures would be used as the basis of apportionment for the 1951 levy. Therefore it is the feeling of this Board of Arbitrators that the fairest possible division of the costs of the North Halton High School Area is on the basis of the new assessments of the various municipalities comprising that area.

Directs that the total costs of the North Halton High School Area for maintenance and for debt charges be divided in the following percentages:
