## Planters Peanut Float Here All Day Saturday

The Planter's Peanut float, originally scheduled to be in Georgetown this Saturday, will arrive on Friday night and be on hand all day Saturday. Accompanying the float will be six college undergrads who serve on the float as peanut men during the summer months.

The float is an original sort of tag day. Instead of donating to Lions Club work and receiving a tag as the symbol, five cent bags of peanuts are given to everyone making a contribution. Like any other tag day, it is up to the individual to contribute what he will. The peanut day has gone over in a big way in such towns as Brampton, Orangeville and Collingwood and the local Lions are optimistic about its success in its first year in Georgetown.

Two prizes are offered to the persons guessing closest to the correct number of peanuts which decorate the float. First prize is \$25 in cash and second a case of Planter's Cocktail peanuts.

In addition to peanut day, the Lions Club has been busy selling cocktail tins house-to-house, in stores and on Main Street for the past three weeks. The club receives 22c on each tin sold and should net a handsome profit. Well over fifty cases have been sold.

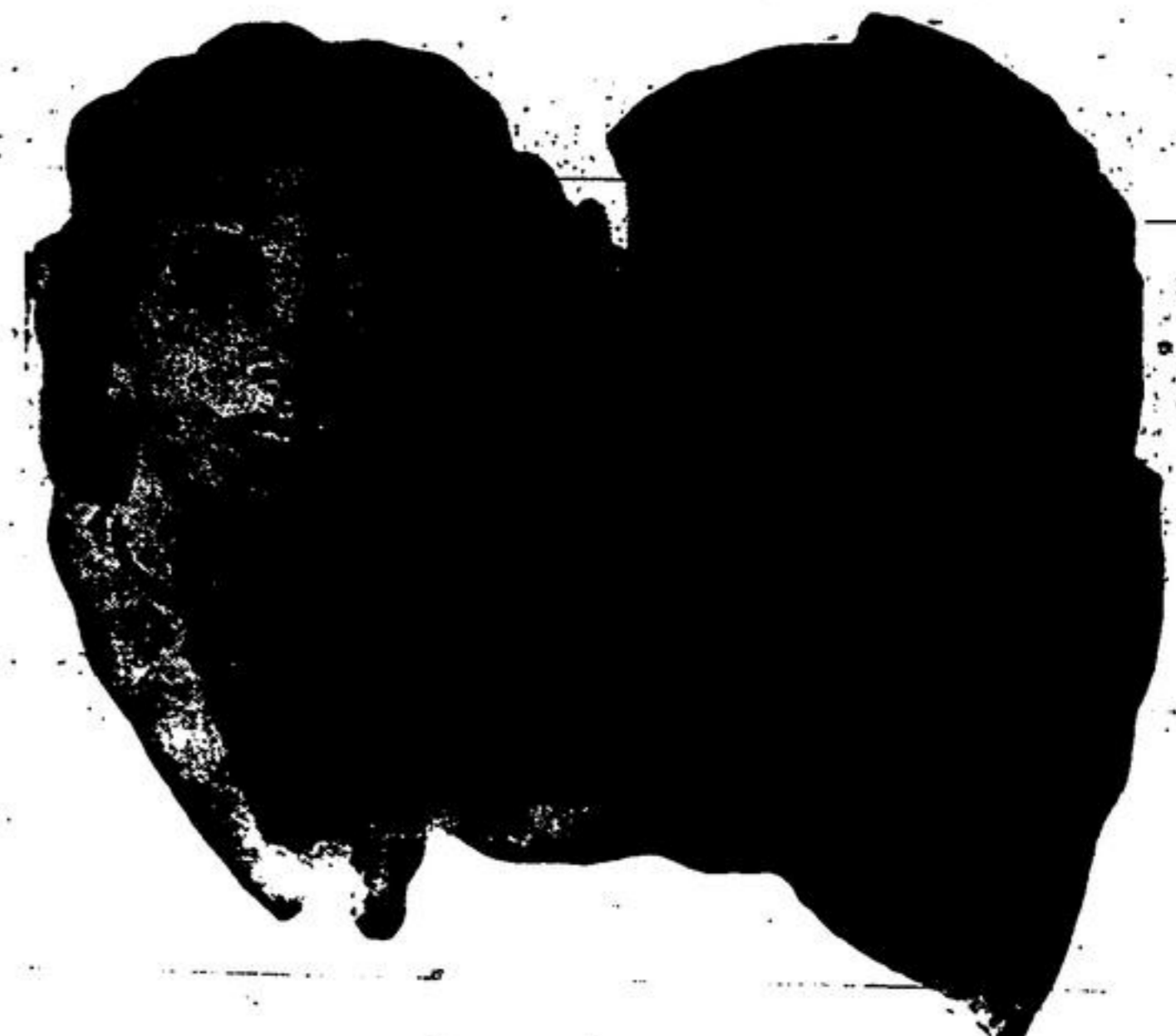
## "Lena Rivers" Comedy By Ballinafad Players

**FENCE TO PROTECT WOODLOT**  
Several years ago Halton County Council as a result of a recommendation of the Halton Conservation Committee passed a by-law which provides a subsidy or grant of \$50 to any property owner who erects a fence to protect his wood lot from livestock.

Since that time quite a number of Halton wood-lot owners have availed themselves of this assistance. There are no restrictions regarding the type of fence as long as it will turn livestock and protect the young seedling trees. Those interested should, however, first contact Mr. Wm. Deans, Halton County Clerk, and secure a copy of the by-law and arrange to have his woodlot approved before proceeding with the erection of the fence.
