Miss Hounslow stressed that the health unit is mainly interested in preventing disease and that any defects found in children are immediately drawn to the attention of Dr. J. M. Mather, the unit head. It is a fact worth knowing that only 80 per cent of Halton children are immunized against diphtheria and it is hoped this will soon be 100 per cent.

Mrs. Ed Sanford, the new president, was in charge of the meeting which was held at the home of Mrs. Paul Spitzer. Mrs. A. J. Smethurst past president, was called upon to conduct the installation of officers.
