FARM NEWS

Hostilities Cease in Battle of Beaver Dam

Beavers released in Nassagaweya Township in 1949 is one of the projects promoted by the Halton Conservation Committee which has put Halton County on the map as one of the few counties in Ontario attempting to carry on an active conservation programme. The beaver have definitely proven that when it comes to conserving water they are in a class by themselves. Unfortunately they do not always build their dams at sites which human beings might select. In short, their engineering ability is unsurpassed but they do not worry themselves about flooded roads. A year ago they flooded one of Nassagaweya township roads which runs nearby. The Township council raised the road a good twenty inches and all went well until this spring when the industry of the beaver coupled with the excessive spring rain flooded the road again. As a result the Nassagaweya Council requested the Department of Lands and Forests to either provide financial assistance to raise the road, or to remove the beaver.

Departmental officers immediately proceeded to remove the beaver by live trapping. Only one was removed, but what a storm of protest went up over the county! Reeve George Currie, chairman of the Halton Conservation Committee immediately called his committee together and what a meeting it turned out to be! It was the largest attended meeting of any yet held by the committee. Strange as it may seem, no one present wanted the beaver removed, not even the members of the Nassagaweya Township Council.

They did feel, however, that Nassagaweya Township should not be solely responsible for further expenditures on the road in question. With this, everyone else at the meeting was in agreement. Conservation of water is an important matter in this county and in particular in the two lower townships where already it has been necessary to build at least 100 farm ponds. Every year in this County a large number of farmers find it necessary to haul or buy water and it is not only most inconvenient, but very expensive. Consequently, it was the recommendation of the Conservation Committee to the Committee on Agriculture and Reforestation of the Halton County Council, that Halton County reimburse Nassagaweya Township for any further expenditures on the road in question which are necessary as a result of further flooding by the beaver. Representatives of the Dept. of Lands & Forests who were present assured the meeting that no further beaver would be removed. In short, an armistice has been signed and while some details have still to be worked out, it would definitely seem that the "Battle of Beaver Dam" is over and the beaver will be allowed to carry on their wonderful engineering projects and create bodies of water which will help to replenish some of Halton's failing springs and wells.

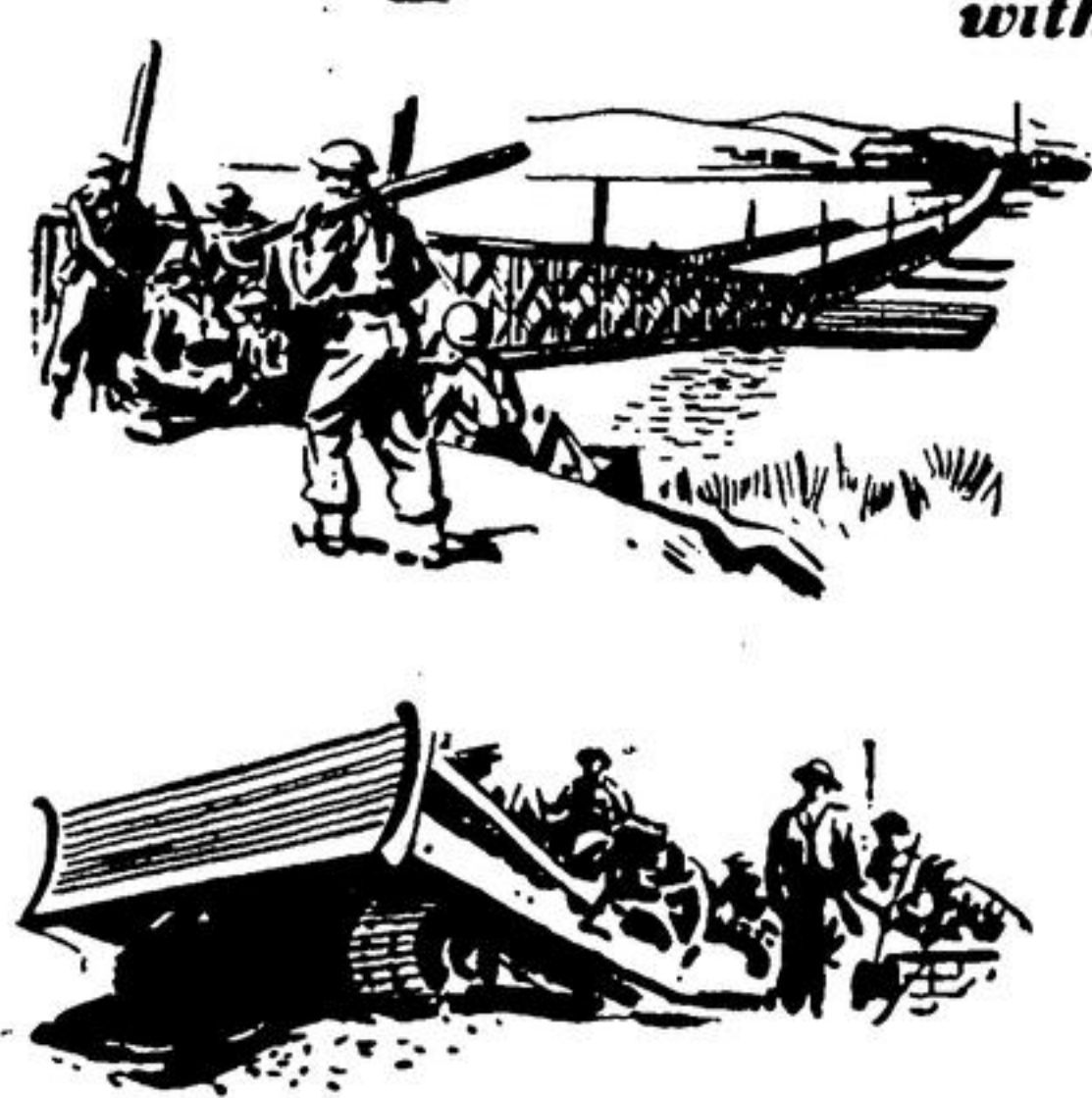

"Blueprints" for Speeches Give Pointers to Lions

Miss Dorothy Stone, commercial artist and art teacher at Georgetown High School, gave members of the Lions Club some pointers on public speaking at their dinner meeting at the McGibbon House last week.

Miss Stone moved from Toronto two years ago and built a new home on the Check Line. She was introduced by J. I. Lambert who spoke of her varied experience as a teacher in private schools and as a work training superintendent at the John Inglis Company during the war years.

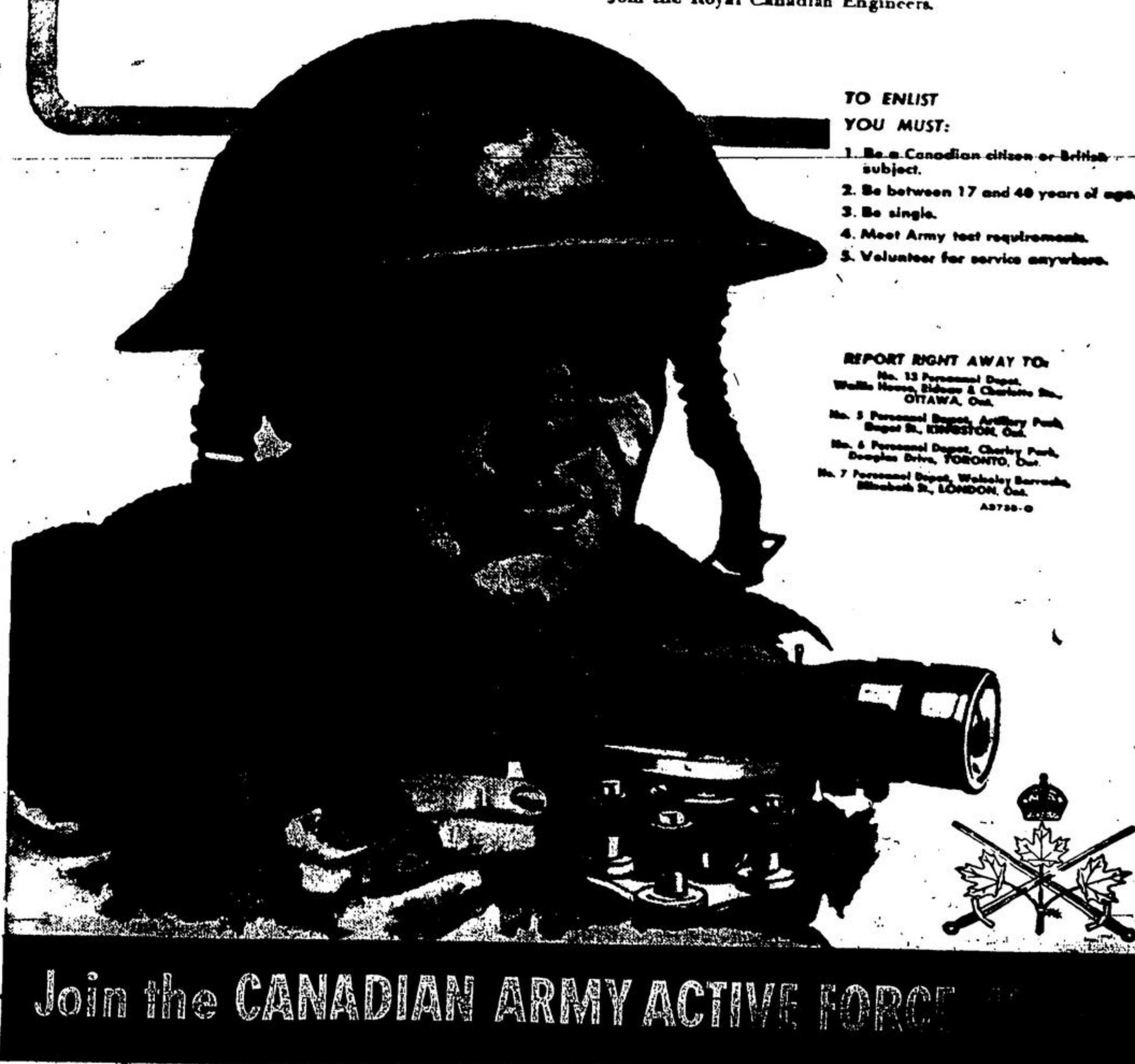
"Public speaking is not a gift," she said, "but an art which is acquired through practice."

Just as we would not expect to build a house without study and experience or to play hockey without learning the rules of the game, so we must learn the rules of speaking, she said. Every speech must have a charted course and the most casual sounding are usually the best prepared.

She gave "blueprints" for different types of speeches and said that if a speaker followed the rules he would never be at a loss for words. For instance, in introducing a speaker, the rule is: Why this subject? To this audience? At this time? By this speaker? An introduction which answers these four questions is a perfect one, she stated.
