### Mrs. William H. Bailey Dies at Son's Home

Margaret Jane Westcott Bailey, wife of the late William H. Bailey, died suddenly on Saturday, May 5th at the home of her son, Calvin, R R 2, Georgetown. She had been active and in good health to the moment of her death. She was in her 82nd year.

She was born in Melancthon Township near Dundalk and lived at Collingwood and Craileath before coming to Hornby as a bride sixty two years ago. Two sons served in the first World War and two grandsons in the second. She was predeceased by her husband in 1921, her daughter Emma in 1933 and by a grandson, David Michie in 1950.

Surviving are two daughters, Ida of Hornby and Mrs. H. C. Michie (Margaret) of Milton and three sons Calvin and George of Hornby, and Bill of Milton. A sister, Mrs. R. G. Clark of Meaford and a brother, George Westcott of Collingwood also survive, as well as ten grandsons, three granddaughters and eight great-grandchildren.

A private service for the family was held at her late home on Tuesday, May 8th, followed by a public service in Bethel United Church. Interment was made in Bethel Church Cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Fred Ainsworth assisted by Pastor Robert Snyder, Bowes Baptist Church. Pallbearers were six grandsons, Harold, Norman, Bill and Elmer Bailey and George and John Michie. Edward and John Bailey and the members of the Bailey Hunt Club were flower bearers.

Harold McClure, proprietor of McClure's Home Furnishings was elected head of Geogetown Retail Merchants Association at a meeting of that organization last Wednesday in the Municipal Building. He succeeds James Goodlet.

Gordon Garner is vice president and bank managers Frank Benner and Fred Chapman were re-elected secretary and treasurer. Executive members are Graham Farnell, James Goodlet, Clarence Bain and Jack Cotton.

A large part of the meeting was devoted to a discussion on store closing hours. Retiring president Goodlet urged merchants to adopt 9 o'clock Saturday closing, claiming that ve. little business was done after that time. Some favoured closing on Mondays and staying open the other six days of the week. Others considered a six or seven o'clock closing Saturday as an improvement. The consensus of opinion is that merchants will tend to follow industry with shorter hours, if for no other reason than to keep adequate help.

Final decision was to have each merchant in town answer a questionnaire, before any definite action toward earlier closing hours is contemplated.

The association will ask the post office department to arrange for a pick-up of mail from the midnight train from Toronto. At present, letters mailed one day in Toronto do not arrive here till mid-morning, and banks and merchants are hampered in dealing with important business by this delay. It was claimed that a similar arrangement is in force in Brampton.

There was some discussion on delaying the May 24th holiday until the following Monday, but it was decided that not enough time was available to tell shoppers and the holiday will remain on the 24th.

The local Orange Lodge has asked that stores stay open all day on Thursday, July 12th when district lodges gather here for their celebration. A petition is being circulated and will be presented to council, asking that stores be allowed to close Wednesday afternoon that week.

Council will also be asked to have angle parking markers on Main Street painted as soon as possible. Membership fee for 1951 was set at \$5.00.
