High School Teachers Further Salary Increases

Teachers in the three North Halton high schools received a further salary increase at a board meeting in Acton Monday.

All teachers were given an increase of \$100 retroactive to the first of the year, and a \$100 increase in September. Previously the teachers had received \$200 at the start of the year and an increase in yearly increment from \$100 to \$200. The salary schedule was adjusted to provide a maximum of \$5,000 for specialists. Principals of the three schools had their salaries boosted

Keen Curler, Bowler Fred Thompson Dies

An enthusiastic sportsman, and a leading member of the local curling and lawn bowling clubs, Fred C. Thompson died at his home on

Edith Street last Saturday evening. Mr. Thompson was a member of a pioneer Esquesing family. He was born on the family homestead, lot 29, concession 11, Esquesing in 1867, a son of the late Joseph Triller Thompson and Maria Gallaher, attended No. 15 School, and farmed with his father, later taking over management of the farm for which the Thompson family had the crown deed and had farmed for 121 years. He married Agnes Leslie on January 2nd, 1895.

The farm was sold to the late Mr. Martin in 1932 Mr. Thompson continuing as farm manager for two years before he moved to Georgetown. As a township resident he served as a councillor for five years in the early twenties, was an elder and held other offices in Union Presbyterian Church, and for forty years was a member of the school board of No. 15. In Georgetown he belonged to Knox Church and was an elder of the church.
