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## Alfred J. Barker New Baptist Pastor

Alfred J. Barker, B.A., B.D., preached his first sermons at the Baptist Church on Sunday. Mr. Barker succeeds Rev. Charles R. Gower, who left last year to accept a call to the Baptist Church at Dresden.

Mr. Barker received his Bachelor of Divinity degree last Tuesday at the convocation of McMaster University. He is a native of Toronto, where he attended Harbord and Jarvis Collegiate. He was employed with the Canadian SKF Company at the time of his enlistment in the army in 1942.

After service overseas with the Ordnance Corps, he took his first year of university at Khaki University, then returned to Canada to complete his schooling at McMaster.

During his studies he has served at various churches in the summer months, including one summer in Calgary, one summer at Monck and Damascus near Arthur and another at Avoca and Rivington in the Ottawa Valley. Last year he was student pastor at Lorne Park and the previous year served as minister's assistant at James Street Church, Hamilton.

Mr. Barker is unmarried. At university he was interested in such extramural activities as the men's choir and the university weekly newspaper. He has three brothers, Dr. Cyril, director of music at First Baptist Church, Detroit, Donald, who works for the Daily Press in Pontiac, Michigan, and Wilfred, an electrician in Toronto.

An ordination service is planned at the church on June 5th. There will also be an induction service at a later date. Mr. Barker is living in the parsonage beside the church.

Renovations are being made at present to the office on Main Street over the Bell Telephone office where Dr. F. R. Watson practiced for so many years until he moved his office to his residence a few years ago.

Dr. Kerby will receive his degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery at convocation on June 6th. Graduating with him is his brother, Dr. William Kerby who will practice in Regina, Saskatchewan.

Dr. Kerby was born in Toronto, moved to Regina with his family and attended public and high school there.
