Co-Op Branch Opens Here Next Month

A branch of the United Co-operators will soon be open in Georgetown.

Announcement is made this week that the Co-Op has taken an option and will locate in the Georgetown Feed Mill premises on the highway. The Georgetown branch will operate in conjunction with the one in Milton and the two branches will be managed by Karl Parr, manager in Milton since last July. The Milton business has been in operation for fifteen years.

Mr. Parr says that he hopes to have the local branch in operation by July 1st. There will be a man in charge locally. The Co-Op will handle feed, fertilizer, seed, fence materials, spray materials and all types of farm supplies.

FARM NEWS

District Farmers Plan Multiflora Rose Hedges

Since our previous announcement that the Multiflora Rose can be secured this fall from the Department of Lands and Forests, there have been numerous requests for application forms at the Agricultural Office in Milton. Since the previous announcement, some additional information on the Multiflora Rose has been secured from J. C. Taylor of the Department of Agriculture at the OAC. Prof. Taylor makes the following comments: "The use of this plant in field hedging is a development of the last three or four years, therefore information as to how it behaves on various soils and under the range of climatic conditions which occur in Ontario is rather scarce. There are no mature hedges of this plant in Ontario as yet, although quite a number have been planted within the last three years. It therefore follows that it will be several years before much is known about its usefulness as a field hedge in Ontario.

Rosa multiflora is well known as a garden plant, and as such it has proven hardy here, but the growing conditions in a garden are decidedly different to those around fields in open and wind-swept locations. The indications are that it will be hardy in southern Ontario.

The plant grows on an average about 7 to 8 feet high (more on good soil) and about as much through. It makes a very dense, thorny growth and reaches its mature height about five years after planting. From then on it does not increase much in height or girth. Occasionally branches will die back, but this should not be serious. A hedge of Rosa multiflora planted about 1 foot apart will form an impenetrable barrier. Young plants will require to be watered if the soil is dry at planting time so that they get a good start.
