## Milton Wins Championship at Four-School Field Day

Milton High School captured the honours at the four-school field meet in Acton last Wednesday. Athletes from the county town scored 134 points to put Georgetown, last year's winner in second spot. Georgetown had 121. Acton scored 94 and Erin 58.

Most notable win for Georgetown was Bill MacCormack's winning of the half mile open, with Don Ford runner up for the Tom Watson challenge trophy. Bill also placed first in the open 440 and first in running broad jump. He was two points below Terry Walker of Milton for senior boys championship.

Grouping was closed for senior girls championship, won by Helen Heslop, Milton, 10. D. Coles, Acton had 9 and Julia DeVries, Georgetown, 7.

Georgetown's intermediate girls contributed to the team points, with Eileen Oates heading this group with 10, and Neretia Zillo second with 7. Two Milton boys were on top of the intermediate boys. Earl Cairns, 13 and E. Dredge, 8.

George Aitken, Erin, was junior champ, J. Harris, Milton, runner up. Janice Baker, Acton and D. Kelman, Milton, were the leading junior girls.

Georgetown showed promise for the future in the bantam classes. Dorothy Williams, 10 and Marilyn Bell, 6 headed the girls. B. Skilling, Acton won the bantam boys championship with George Webster, Georgetown, second.
