The uncontrolled destruction of hawks and owls at the hands of uninformed and careless hunters might leave the rodents in your area free of natural control for years. This is the warning issued by the Ontario Dept of Lands' and Forests, in pointing out that predators could be the factor that goveras the success or failure of a plantation of forest trees

New plantations of all species, particularly hardwoods, are susceptible to rodent damage until the bark around the base of the trees hardens and so becomes unpalatable to the pests Damage is especially severe where the sod is heavy and the grass long

Of the rodents, the common field mouse is one of the most destructive Heavy sod and long grass is very favourable habitat for the mice and they apparently find the tender bark of young trees a welcome change in diet. This rodent works under the snow and so damage to the plantation is not usually discovered until spring Injury is sometimes caused by other small animals, such as rabbits, squirrels and chipmunks

It has been found that increasing deer herds in agricultural areas, where damage to property ceates a considerable problem, may make necessary more freedom in hunting them on these areas than has previously been allowed.

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
