

WONDERFUL TOUR FOR FARM BOY-PLOWMEN

After a week of sight seeing, the four Ontario farm boys now touring the Eastern United States under the direction of LeRoy G. Brown, provincial agricultural representative at Lindsay, are just a little breathless.

Following a preliminary stop at the Ridgeway Experimental Station and Agricultural School, the party called at the headquarters of the Ohio breeders Co-Operative at Tiffin where they had an opportunity to study the elaborate facilities for artificial insemination servicing herds throughout the state. While in Ohio, they also visited the famous Blu-

baugh and Malabar Farms, the latter owned by Louis Bromfield, and Pleasant Hill Lake, a major development in the Muskingum Conservancy District. This spring, part of the area bordering the Mohawk dam was flooded to a depth of 35 feet but has since been planted to grain and corn.

Tuberculosis Group is New County Organization

Carry On Work Started By Oakville Lions Club

A new county organization was formed at a dinner meeting at the Milton Inn on Monday. Known as the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association, it will expand the work inaugurated a few years ago by Oakville Lions Club.

Heading the association are Donald Stevens, Oakville, president; R. S. Heatherington, Campbellville, vice president; Stan Otton, Oakville, treasurer; and Mrs. M. E. Lunau, Oakville, secretary. Committee members are Amos Mason, Acton; Walter Blehn, Georgetown; Gordon Gowland, Milton and William H. Edwards, Oakville. A member from Burlington will be added to the committee.

Mr. Ed O'Brien, executive secretary of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association gave an informal talk at the meeting outlining the work which the new organization could do. There have been great strides in work with the disease since formation of the Canadian association in 1900. Up to this time there had been no efficient treatment for TB and the association busied itself with promoting hospitalization of cases. Since that time fourteen sanatoriums have been built, and eleven of these are maintained by voluntary organizations. Treatment for patients is free, the patient contributing whatever he wishes towards his treatment.

He stressed the fact that a voluntary organization augments the work of the official agency, which in this county is the Health Unit. It is the Health Unit's job to control and treat TB, but a voluntary organization can materially assist in locating cases.

The organization has a great field in education. There are many people who do not know TB is contagious, said Mr. O'Reilly, who do not know that there are free X-ray clinics in the county. There is rehabilitation work to be done for those discharged from the san, travelling clinics to promote, and of course the money to raise through sale of Christmas seals.

Oakville Lions have been in charge of this work for six years and have a surplus of \$4,000 to turn over to the new organization. Last year a total of \$4,300 was raised, with expenses being about \$1500.

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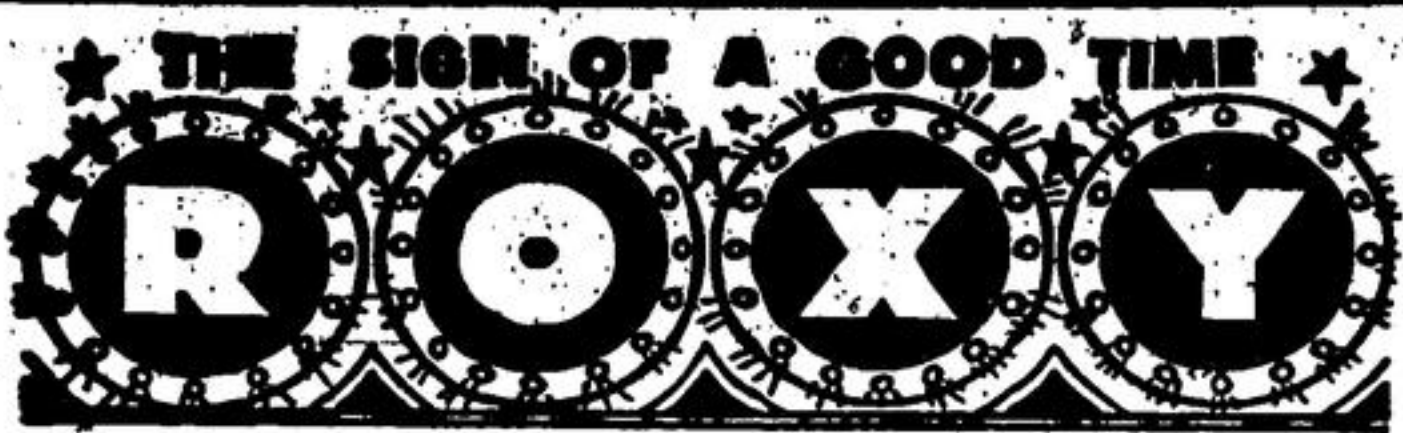

Convincing Themselves Their New Shoes Are Real



These two Italian youngsters can scarcely believe their own eyes, as they examine two of 500,000 pairs of shoes made and distributed in Italy through a project sponsored by the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund. Scenes like this one will soon be repeated again and again in the south Italian commune of Polino, where Mayor had reluctantly turned down a UNICEF offer of 50 pairs of shoes, because 500 children had no shoes at all and he hadn't the heart to pick out only 50 lucky ones. Now he doesn't have to make the choice, because 50 manufacturers in the United States, reading of his dilemma, telephoned UNICEF and offered to ship 500 pairs of shoes free for all of Polino's modest children.
